One who is glorious among the martyrs? /
O champ'ion of Truth, and great accuser of deception, /
Pray now that our souls may be saved.
What shall we call thee, O holy hierarch? /
A river flowing from the noetic Eden /
Which quenches the earth with spiritual water? /
A flood which drowns the followers of Arius? /
A pillar of fire guiding the new people by divine grace? ///
Pray now that our souls may be saved.
What shall we call thee, O Eusebius? /
A teacher of piety /
Who destroyeth impiety? /
The adornment of martyrs and the joy of priests? /
A sickle cutting down weeds and gathering the wheat of heaven? /
An ever-flowing fountain of miracles /
Providing relief from the burning heat of infirmities? /
Pray now that our souls may be saved.
      Note: But if we sing "Alleluia" at Matins instead of "God is the Lord," then
      these 3 stichera to the Theotokos are sung at Vespers, at "Lord I call," before
      the above stichera of the Saint, in the same Tone and melody.
      Strange and awesome is the mystery /
      Of thy seedless conception, /
      That surpasses the thoughts of all, O pure Virgin. /
      For thou has given birth to Him who is of one essence with the Father, /
      Upon whom the many-eyed cherubīm dare not gaze /
      And before whom all the ranks of angels tremble. ///
      We glorify thee who hath given Him birth, O Bride of God.
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Whom art thou emulating, O wretched soul? /
      One who never rises to repentance? /
      One not afraid of the fire awaiting the wicked? /
      Arise, and quickly call on her who is our lone defense, /
      And cry out: "O Virgin Mother! /
      Entreat thy Son and our God ///
      That He deliver my soul from the snare of the deceiver!"
      O Sovereign Lady, thou helper of all in need, /
      Send down a drop of thy myrrh and have mercy on me /
      Who am tossed by the tempest on the sea of darkness /
      Surrounded by the billowing waves of the evils of this life. /
      O, stretch out thy helping hand to me, /
      That I may obtain the portion of the righteous and chosen, ///
      For thou hast given birth to the Lover of mankind!
Glory..., now and ever..., Theotokion, in the Tone 8:
o immaculate and must-pure Lady, /
Who gavest birth to the Ember of divine fire /
Which comsumeth all sins and sprinkles the faithful with dew: /
Burn up the chaff of my countless offenses /
And cool my soul with the dew of thy grace /
For she hath been withered by my passions, ///
So that I, thy servant, may ever glorify thy mercy and thy power!

When she beheld the Lamb /
Stretched out by His own will upon the Tree of the Cross, /
With maternal tears the Ewe-lamb cried aloud: /
"Oh, my Son, what is this strange sight that I see? /
How is it that Thou, who giveth life to all as Lord, /
Is put to death, O longsuffering One, /
While granting the earthborn the resurrection? ///
I glorify Thy great condescension, O my God!"
The General Troparion of the Saint, in Tone 4: (None given in the Menaion)
Like the apostles in character, /
A successor on their throne. O divinely-inspired one /
Through visions thou didst find thy work /
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HIEROMARTYR EUSEBIUS, BISHOP OF SAMOSATA

Rightly dividing the <u>word</u> of truth. /
Thou didst suffer for the <u>sake</u> of the faith /
Even to the <u>she</u>dding of thy blood ///
O hieromartyr Eusebius, pray to Christ God that our souls may be saved.
