The 13th Day of October Martyrs Carpus, Papýlus and those with them at Pergamum.

Vespers

At "Lord I call...," 3 stichera, in Tone 4: To the melody, "As one valiant among the martyrs...."

Bound in chains, confined in <u>prison</u>, / Hung aloft, flayed alive and <u>cast</u> into the flames / As <u>food</u> you were given to the <u>wild</u> beasts; / But receiving divine help from heaven <u>stea</u>dfast you remained, / Having love toward the Master and <u>Sa</u>vior of all, /// O most-wise Carpus and Pa<u>py</u>lus.

Having strengthened thy thoughts on the <u>rock</u> of faith, / With infallible wisdom, O martyr Pa<u>py</u>lus, / Thou didst rejoice at thy <u>stoning</u>, / Likening thyself to the divine protomartyr and archdeacon <u>Stephen</u>, / As a servant and minister of the divine <u>My</u>steries, /// Numbered among the martyrs and a converser with the <u>angels</u>.

Infallibly proceeding on the path of <u>wi</u>tness, / Your feet nailed into <u>sha</u>ckles of iron, / You <u>trampled the sting of the enemy and destroyer</u>, / You crushed his power, O all-<u>praised</u> ones, / And were crowned with many <u>vi</u>ctories / Therefore, the whole Church of Christ celebrates your holy <u>me</u>mory, /// O light-bearing and illustrious <u>ma</u>rtyrs.

Glory..., in Tone 6:

Being accounted worthy of seeing God /
Thou didst see the heavens open, O venerable one, /
And the Lord sitting on the Throne, with the Cherubim and Seraphim standing 'round about, /
And now, O Carpus, we thy flock, being illumined, cry aloud to thee: ///
Entreat peace for the world and great mercy for our souls.

Now and ever..., Dogmatic Theotokion, in Tone 6:

Who will not bless thee, O most holy <u>Virgin?</u> / Who will not sing of thy most pure child-<u>bea</u>ring? /

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The only-begotten Son shone timelessly from the <u>Fa</u>ther, / But from thee He was ineffably in<u>ca</u>rnate; / God by nature, yet <u>man</u> for our sake; / Not two persons, but one in two <u>na</u>tures. / Entreat Him, O pure and all-blessèd <u>La</u>dy /// To have <u>me</u>rcy on our souls.

Or the Stavrotheotokion: *To the melody, "On the third day...."*

Beholding Thee, our Life suspended on the tree / The all-pure Theotokos cried a<u>loud</u> to Thee / With maternal <u>so</u>rrow: / "O my <u>Son</u> and my God, /// Save those who lovingly <u>sing</u> to Thee.

Or Dogmatic Theotokion in the Tone of the Week if a Resurrection service.

The Apostikha from the Octoechos.

The Troparion of the Martyrs, in Tone 4:

Thy holy <u>ma</u>rtyrs, O Lord / Through their sufferings received their incorruptible crowns from <u>Thee</u>, our God. / For having Thy strength they laid low their <u>enemies</u> / And shattered the powerless boldness of <u>demons</u>. /// Through their intercessions, O Christ God, <u>save</u> our souls.

Two Canons from the Octoechos, and one for the Martyrs with 4 Troparia, in Tone 1, having the acrostic: "Carpus and Papylus are praised in song," the composition of Joseph. — incomplete as of 8/2013

The Kontakion of the Martyrs, Tone 4:

You gave your relics to those on earth as a costly treasury of the <u>Ma</u>ster / And a fountain spilling out streams of <u>hea</u>lings to all. / Thus they are dispelling the infirmities of divers <u>pa</u>ssions / Ceaselessly giving <u>grace</u> to our souls. /// Therefore with one voice we lovingly celebrate your festival, O <u>ma</u>rtyrs divine!
