## Vespers

## At "Lord, I call...," 3 stichera, in Tone 4: To the melody, "Thou hast given a sign...."

Thine all-laudable memory, O <u>ve</u>n'rable one, / Hath shone forth <u>brigh</u>ter than the sun / Illumining all with the brilliant rays of thy <u>vi</u>rtues / And enlightening the faithful with the radiance of thy <u>mi</u>racles / Therefore, we keep thy feast, O <u>ble</u>ssèd one /// Joyfully honoring and blessing thee, as the praise of mo<u>na</u>stics.

Living thy life as an earthly angel, O richly <u>ble</u>ssèd one / Thou didst wither thy mortal body through fasting and <u>vigils</u> / Divinely <u>mindful of death</u>, O <u>fa</u>ther, / Steadily increasing in thine ascent to thy <u>fi</u>nal desire, /// And didst attain its perfect ful<u>fi</u>llment.

A wonder beyond under<u>standing</u> / Occurred at thy falling asleep, O wondrous and <u>ven</u>'rable one / When the <u>ranks</u> of saints suddenly appeared, O <u>fa</u>ther / And thy countenance <u>shone</u> like the sun, / Revealing thy splendid beauty and the <u>pu</u>rity of thy soul /// Convincing all of the blessèdness of <u>thy</u> repose.

### **Glory..., in Tone 8:**

We <u>honor thee</u>, O our father <u>Si</u>soës, / As an instructor of a <u>multitude of monks</u> / Teaching us to walk truthfully in the <u>steps of</u> thy way / Blessèd art thou in thy <u>la</u>bors for Christ / For through them thou didst denounce the power of the <u>enemy</u>, / O converser with the <u>angels</u> / And companion of the venerable and <u>righteous ones</u>, /// Together with them, pray to the Lord that He will have <u>me</u>rcy on our souls.

### Now and ever..., Theotokion, or the Stavrotheotokion:

Beholding her <u>Child</u> upon the Tree / As a willing <u>sa</u>crifice, / The unblemished <u>Mai</u>den wept <u>bitterly</u> / And she cried la<u>men</u>ting: / "Woe is me, my be<u>loved Child</u> / What hath the ungrateful <u>people done</u> to Thee? /// Wishing to leave me childless, O my be<u>loved One.</u>"

Or Dogmatic Theotokion if a Resurrection service.

### The Troparion of the Saint, in Tone 1:

O <u>dwe</u>ller in the wilderness and angel in the <u>bo</u>dy, / Thou wast a wonderworker, O our God-bearing father <u>Si</u>soës. / Thou didst re<u>ceive</u> heavenly gifts / Through fasting, <u>vigil</u> and prayer: / <u>Hea</u>ling the sick and the souls of those drawn to <u>thee</u> by faith. / Glory to Him who <u>gave</u> thee strength! / <u>Glory</u> to Him who hath granted thee a <u>crown</u>! /// Glory to Him who through thee grants <u>hea</u>ling to all!
