# Commemoration of our Venerable Fathers Paul of Thebes and John Calybites (the Hut-Dweller).

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Vespers
At "Lord, I call...," 6 stichera:
3 stichera of St. Paul, in Tone 1: To the melody, "Joy of the ranks of heaven..."
Thou didst reveal thyself to the world as a paragon of the virtues, /
Ascending on the steps that lead to heaven. /
For the ascent of the spirit was well established in thy soul, /
O thrice-bless't father Paul. /
Therefore, thou didst attain the heights of goodness ///
Through thine abstinence and ascetic labor.
In thy desire for God, O blessed one, /
Thou didst ascend from the wilderness as if mounted on wings, /
And from the darkness thou didst approach the desert on high /
There to be illumined by the knowledge of God, /
And thy soul was divinely anointed ///
With the chrism of the virtues.
The desert blossomed with the beautiful flowers of thy virtues, /
For thou didst destroy the thorns of the passions there, /
And didst sow the seeds of thy godly deeds /
By thy glorious labors; /
And like the sweet fragrance of a lily ///
Thou dost now perfume us with sweet fragrance of thy life.
And 3 stichera of venerable St. John, in Tone 2: To the melody, "When from the
Tree...."
When by the call of God thou didst flee the beauties of this world rejoicing,
O ven'rable father John, /
Thou didst prefer to take the hard and painful narrow way. /
Then, stripping away through thy fasting all the passions /
And clothing thyself in the image of godliness ///
Thou didst take upon thyself the care of many souls, O divinely blessed one.
Thou didst devise an amazing way of life,
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Whose ineffable poverty thou didst gladly emulate, /
As one homeless at thy parents' gates, /
Thou didst suffer oppression and afflictions, O father; /
Patiently didst thou endure, /
Wherefore, thou wast laden with spiritual gifts ///
And hast inherited riches in heaven that cannot be taken away.
Bearing the sacred Gospel in thy hands /
Thou didst fulfill its commandment, O father, /
Thou didst spurn thy parents wealth /
And didst perféct thy life through poverty and tears. /
Therefore, thou dost now delight, O blessed one, ///
In divine comfort and eternal joy.
Glory..., in Tone 2: (usual melody)
Rejecting all the things of this world /
Thou didst take up the Gospel and followed Christ /
And living in a hut, as though in the garden of Paradise /
Thou didst crush the serpent, the slayer of mankind /
Through the harshness of thy life and the discipline of thy flesh. /
Therefore, abiding now in the heavens, O blessed John, ///
Intercede with Christ for great mercy on our souls.
Now and ever..., Theotokion, in Tone 2, or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same
Tone: To the melody, "When from the tree...."
Beholding Thee, her Lamb being voluntarily led to the slaughter /
The caste ewe-lamb wept and cried aloud: /
"What dost thou do, striving to make me childless, O Christ, /
Who gave birth to Thee, the Deliverer of all? /
Yet I glorify Thine ineffable grace past all understanding, O Lover of mankind.
Or Dogmatic Theotokion in the Tone of the Week if a Resurrection service.
The Aposticha is from the Octoechos, then:
Glory..., to the venerable St. Paul, in Tone 6:
O ven'rable father Paul /
The proclamation of thy teachings hath gone out into all the world, /
Therefore thou hast obtained the reward of thy labors in heaven; /
Thou hast destroyed legions of demons, /

And attained to the choirs of the <u>angels</u> / Whose life thou didst blamelessly <u>e</u>mulate, / Having now boldness before <u>Christ</u> our God, /// Pray for the peace of the world and the salvation of our souls.

Now and ever..., Theotokion, in Tone 6, or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone: To the melody "On the third day...."

Beholding Thee <u>cru</u>cified, O Christ /
She who gave Thee birth cried <u>out</u> to <u>Thee</u>: /
"What is this strange mystery I <u>see</u>, my Son? /
How, being hung in the flesh, the <u>Gi</u>ver of Life, ///
Dost Thou die on the Tree?"

## The Troparion of the Saints, in Tone 4:

O God of our <u>fa</u>thers /
Deal with us according to Thy compassion /
Take not away Thy <u>mer</u>cy from us /
But through the prayers of our <u>fa</u>thers ///
Guide our lives along the <u>way</u> of peace.

### **Matins**

One Canon from the Octoechos, with 6 Troparia, including the Irmos; and two Canons of the Saints, with 8 Troparia each.

After the Third Ode, the Kontakion of the venerable St. Paul, in Tone 3: To the melody, "Today the Virgin..."

Let us assemble today, O ye <u>fai</u>thful, /
And let us praise our venerable <u>fa</u>ther Paul; /
For he shone forth as the brilliant reflection of the <u>spi</u>ritual Sun /
And lead those in the darkness of ignorance to the heights of <u>hea</u>ven. ///
Paul, thou art the adornment of Thebes and the glory of the <u>fa</u>thers and all the saints.

After the Sixth Ode, the Kontakion of the venerable St. John, in Tone 2: To the melody, "Seeking the highest...."

Like Christ thou didst love to be <u>humble</u> in heart / And thou didst give up the <u>parents</u>' wealth / Carrying the Gospel in thy hands /

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Thou didst follow <u>Christ</u> God. ///
Intercede with Him <u>cease</u>lessly for us all.

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
