The 4th Day of July¹

The Commemoration of our Father among the Saints Andrew of Jerusalem, Archbishop of Crete; and our Venerable Mother Martha, Mother of St. Simeon of the Holy Mountain.

Vespers

At "Lord, I call...," 6 stichera,

3 stichera of the St. Andrew, in Tone 1: To the melody, "Joy of the rank of heaven...."

Despising the authority of earthly things over the flesh / And having a pure temperament and a simple heart, / Thou didst earnestly cleave to the Lord, O father, most-wise, / And wast shown to be an inspired instrument of the Comforter /// Playing the divine psalmody of salvation for us all.

Thou didst <u>ho</u>nor the Mother of the Lord with great <u>hymns</u> of praise / And with the sweetness of thy <u>di</u>scourse / Thou didst <u>a</u>lso honor the holy apostles and the company of the blessèd <u>ma</u>rtyrs / Together with them, be mindful of us <u>now</u> who <u>ho</u>nor thee, /// O holy hierarch father <u>A</u>ndrew.

We <u>know</u> thee to be a pillar of <u>O</u>rthodoxy, / An example of meekness and a model of <u>cha</u>stity, / A godly hym<u>no</u>grapher glorifying the beautiful the<u>o</u>logy of the Church, / Therefore, on this day we celebrate thy <u>holy memory</u>, /// O holy hierarch father Andrew, initiate of the <u>my</u>steries of Christ.

And 3 stichera of Venerable Martha, in Tone 4: To the melody, "As one valiant among the martyrs...."

Thou didst dedicate thyself to the difficult struggles of the ascetic life / And the courageous battle against the hordes of the enemy / Who through their <u>ha</u>tred have crippled our human <u>na</u>ture; / And by fasting and tears thou didst set thyself a<u>part</u> for this / Not sparing thy flesh for the sake of thy <u>love</u> of God. / Therefore, thou didst undertake thy <u>go</u>dly task / And didst cast down the evil intent of the <u>a</u>dversary, /// O Martha, our honored and most glorious <u>mo</u>ther. (twice)

Thou didst spurn all the transitory <u>things</u> of this world / And come to despise that which is cor<u>ruptible</u>, /

Desiring <u>only</u> to attain to the everlasting heavenly <u>portion</u> / Meant for the pure and the <u>righteous</u>; / Thus, thou didst inherit eternal life, O <u>pure</u> one. / And now we honor thee, O glorious <u>Ma</u>rtha, /// And we celebrate thy radiant and splendid <u>me</u>mory.

Glory..., in Tone 4:

O all glorious <u>Ma</u>rtha, / Thou dost drive evil <u>spi</u>rits away, / Re<u>lie</u>ving ailments with the grace of the <u>Spi</u>rit, / Healing all suffering and enlightening the faithful with the radiance of thy <u>mi</u>racles. / Therefore we ceaselessly honor thee with sacred <u>hymns</u> of praise /// And we celebrate thy radiant and right-wondrous <u>me</u>mory.

Now and ever..., Theotokion, or this Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone:

Seeing Thee the Lamb and <u>Shepherd on the tree</u>, / The ewe-lamb who gave birth to Thee la<u>mented</u>, / And as a <u>mother cried out</u> to Thee: / "O desired Son, how art Thou hung on the <u>Tree</u> of the Cross, / O Long<u>suffering One?</u> / How art Thy hands and feet nailed by the trans<u>gre</u>ssors, O Word? / How dost Thou shed Thy Blood, O Master?

The Aposticha from the Octoechos, and

Glory..., in Tone 8:

We honor thee as the instructor of a multitude of monastics, / O our father <u>Andrew;</u> / For truly we have learned to walk aright by <u>following in</u> thy steps. / Blessèd art thou, for having <u>labored</u> for Christ, / Thou hast destroyed the power of the <u>enemy</u>, / O converser with the angels and companion of the <u>righteous</u>, /// Pray with them to the Lord that He grant our souls great <u>mercy</u>.

Now and ever..., Theotokion, or this Stavrotheotokion, in Tone 8: *To the melody "O most glorious wonder"*

Be<u>ho</u>lding her <u>Child</u> upon the Tree / As a willing <u>sa</u>crifice, / The unblemished <u>Mai</u>den wept <u>bitterly</u> / And she cried la<u>me</u>nting: /

ST. ANDREW OF JERUSALEM, BISHOP OF CRETE & OUR VENERABLE MOTHER MARTHA, MOTHER OF ST. SIMEON OF THE HOLY MOUNTAIN

"Woe is me, my be<u>loved Child</u> / What hath the ungrateful <u>people done</u> to Thee? /// Wishing to leave me childless, O my be<u>loved One.</u>"

The Troparion of the St. Andrew, in Tone 4:

In truth thou wast revealed to thy flock as a <u>rule</u> of faith, A model of humility and teacher of <u>abstinence</u>, / So thou didst win the heights of humility, riches by <u>poverty</u>; / O holy hierarch, father <u>A</u>ndrew, / Intercede with Christ our God to <u>save</u> our souls.

Glory..., the Troparion of the Venerable Martha, in Tone 8:

The image of God was truly preserved in thee, O <u>mo</u>ther, / For thou didst take up thy cross and <u>fo</u>llow Christ / By so doing thou didst teach us to disregard the flesh, for it <u>pa</u>sses away / But to care instead for the soul, since it is im<u>mo</u>rtal /// Therefore thy spirit, O holy Martha, rejoices with the <u>angels</u>.

Now and ever..., Theotokion or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone.

Matins

One Canon from the Octoechos, with 6 Troparia, including the Irmos; and two Canons, one for each Saints, with 8 Troparia.

After the Third ode, the Kontakion of Ven. Mother Martha, Tone 2: To the melody, "In prayers"

Keeping <u>vigil</u> before the Lord and the all-pure Theo<u>to</u>kos in prayer, / And offering up thy <u>songs</u> of praise, / Thou gavest <u>birth</u> to thy precious child Simeon, O venerable <u>Ma</u>rtha, /// And together with him thou dost ever pray to Christ for us all.

After the Sixth Ode, the Kontakion of St. Andrew, in Tone 2: *To the melody, "Seeking the highest...."*

Having <u>sounded</u> clearly thy hymns of divine <u>sweetness</u> / Thou hast shown forth as a beacon to <u>all</u> the world, / Shining <u>brightly</u> with the Light of the Holy <u>Trinity</u>, /
