Ode 4 Canon of the Mother of God

Irmos: I have heard the mystery of Thy dispensation, O Lord; I have considered Thy works and I glorify Thy Godhead.

O Mother of God, save us who praise thee, for the life-giving Staff of wheat hath been sown in untouched meadow of thy virginal womb and giveth life to the world.

Being so enlightened, we all know thee to be truly Theotokos, for the Sun of Righteousness hath shone forth from thee, O Ever-virgin Lady.

Cleanse Thou, our ignorant transgressions, O only sinless One, and grant peace to the world, through the prayers of her who gave Thee birth, O God.

First Canon of the Bodiless Angels

Irmos: Thou hast set upon Thy swift steeds, Thine apostles, and taken into Thine hands their reins to bring salvation to those who cry to Thee with faith: Glory to Thy power, O Lord!

Thou hast set upon Thine angels as upon swift steeds and hast taken their reins into Thine hands, and riding forth, Thou hast brought salvation to those who ceaselessly cry out to Thee: Glory to Thy power, O Lord!

The angels are clothed in all thy virtues, O Lover of mankind, and the ends of the earth are full of thy divine and glorious praise, O Pre-eternal One, and with them we cry aloud to Thee: Glory to Thy power, O Lord!

Thou didst go forth full of pity, O Christ, for the salvation of mankind summoning together Thy friends, the powers of heaven, and Thy coming hath brought gladness to those who cry to Thee with faith: Glory to Thy power, O Lord!

Theotokion: Thou, O all-pure one, art revealed beyond all nature as both Virgin and Mother, for thou hast borne Christ who is both God and man, to whom the ranks of angels cry aloud in fear: Glory to Thy power, O Lord!

Second Canon of the Bodiless Angels

Irmos: Thou art my strength, O Lord, my God, my power, my joy; without leaving Thy Father's bosom Thou hast visited our wretchedness. So, with the prophet Habbákuk I cry to Thee: Glory to Thy power, O Lover of man.

In Jericho in days of old, the Archangel Michael, the foremost leader of the bodiless hosts, appeared to Joshua, the son of Nun, as he was waging war; and having received strength from him, Joshua, the servant of the Lord, won the day taking the enemy captive at the point of a spear.

Once, in days gone by, the great and truly divine Archangel Gabriel brought the good tidings of a child to Zacharias the priest; and John, the voice of the Word, was born, restoring speech again to Zacharias, his father.

All the ends of the earth rejoice today, O God, as they celebrate the honorable feast day of Thine archangels, Michael the divine, and Gabriel the wise; and the whole host of angels rejoices too, for the world is kept safe under their protection.

Theotokion: Thou alone amongst women remained pure and virgin after giving birth; and with thine own milk didst thou nourish the true Word of the Father, who by the Holy Spirit took our form, that of a servant, O Virgin Mother of God; and now we venerate the divine likeness of his countenance.

Ode 5 Canon of the Mother of God

Irmos: Rising early we cry to Thee, O Lord: Save us, for Thou art our God, and we know none other than Thee.

Still the unbearable storm of my passions, O thou who gavest birth to Christ, our Helmsman, and our Lord.

The ranks of angels and the assemblies of men all worship Him who was born of thee, O all-pure Theotokos.

O unwedded Theotokos Mary, bring to naught the wishes of the enemies, and gladden the hearts of those who praise thee.

First Canon of the Bodiless Angels

Irmos: Bring my soul, which hast lost its way, toward salvation, out of the night of ignorance with the light of Thy wisdom, O Lord, and establish me upon the path of Thy commandments.

Borne into the heights by an inexorable longing for Thee, O Christ, Thou summit of all desires, the hosts of angel glorify Thee without ceasing.

By grace hast Thou established Thy choir of rational and immortal angels to ever praise Thy majesty, fashioning them according to Thine own image, O indescribable One!

Thou, O Christ, keepest Thy ministers by Thy side as they are steadfast against evil, for being the source of all goodness, Thou doest good to them that serve Thee worthily.

Theotokion: Enliven my soul slain by the vile passions of the flesh, O all-undefiled one, who gavest birth the Giver of life, and establish me on the path of the blessèd and everlasting life.

Second Canon of the Bodiless Angels

Irmos: Why hast Thou cast me away from Thy face, O never setting Light? Why hast this dismal

darkness covered me, the wretched one? Guide me in return to the light of Thy commandments, I pray Thee.

Once, in days gone by, Balaam the prophet was not persuaded by the ineffable and divine miracles of God, until an angel appeared at the crossroad to his donkey who wondrously reproved him. Thus, the rational beast changed what Balaam knew of nature.

An angel of God appeared to Peter who, arrested by Herod, was languishing in prison, and he delivered him from bonds and death. Therefore, let us all come and honor the wise archangels, those divine guardians of our souls.

O ye angels and archangels, divine ministers of God, through your perpetual intercessions before Him, destroy the discord and the heresies within the Church, and removing all temptations, preserve our lives in peace.

Theotokion: We know Thee as the God of all creation, One in two natures, with two wills and actions unconfused, the Son of God who took flesh from a woman, and we venerate the icons of Thine image.

Ode 6 Canon of the Mother of God

Irmos: Grant me a robe of light, O Thou who clothes Thyself with light as with a garment, O greatly merciful Christ our God.

We the faithful declare that thou art the temple and the ark of God, the living bridal-chamber and the gate of heaven, O Mother of God.

O Mary, bride of God, Christ thy Son, the destroyer of idolatry, who was borne of thee, is God worshipped together with the Father and the Spirit.

The Word of God hath revealed thee, O Theotokos, to be the ladder leading to heaven, for through thee, He hath descended to us on earth.

First Canon of the Bodiless Angels

Irmos: Thou didst appoint Jonah alone to dwell in the belly of the whale; do Thou deliver me, who am bound in the nets of evil, out from corruption, O Lord.

By a single word didst Thou bring the immortal heavenly hosts into being from not being, O Lord, endowing them with the brilliance of Thy light.

O ye incorporeal angels and honorable initiates of the mysteries of God, ye citizens of heaven and divine tabernacles of the Lord, worthily do ye serve the Creator of all.

The rational and intelligent ranks of the bodiless powers ceaselessly praise and glorify Thee as the Maker and Creator of all things, O Pre-eternal Son of God.

Theotokion: O most pure Lady, thou wast accounted worthy to hold in thy embrace Him, who sits forever with the Father in the Highest. Grant that He be merciful to us, thy servants.

Second Canon of the Bodiless Angels

Irmos: Cleanse me, O my Savior; for great are my transgressions; Lead me from the abyss of sin, I pray, and I cry to Thee: Hear me, O God of my salvation!

Let us with trembling and with our lips of clay, praise and honor the bodiless angels who like fire, flame, and light, take immaterial flight away from material corruption.

Still the storms of the passions, O ye archangels, and calm all turmoil against the Faith, for ye are truly the fiery commanders of the legions of the Trinity's hosts.

O ye archangels of God, Michael and Gabriel, leaders of all the bodiless powers, preserve us from every heresy through your intercessions.

Theotokion: Thou didst appear of Thine own will from the womb, made flesh of a woman who knew not man. Being God without flesh, Thou hast come as a man in the flesh, O Christ, and we, the faithful, honor Thine appearance.

Katavasia.

The Kontakion of the Bodiless Angels, in Tone 2: *To the melody: "When Thou didst descend...."*

O ye <u>princes</u> and leaders of the <u>armies</u> of God, /
Servants of the divine glory and in<u>structors</u> of men, /
<u>Ask</u> whatever is <u>good</u> for us /
And bountiful <u>mercy</u>, ///
O ye commanders of the heavenly hosts.

Ikos: O immortal Lover of mankind, Thou didst say in Thy scripture that heaven rejoiceth at the repentance of a single man. Therefore, we, wallowing in our sin, boldly and at every hour entreat Thee, who alone are without sin and knowest the hearts of men, to take pity on us, unworthy though we be, and in that Thou art compassionate, to send down upon us Thy loving kindness, granting us the forgiveness of our sins, through the intercessions of the leaders of the bodiless angels who ceaselessly pray for us all.

Ode 7 Canon of the Mother of God

Irmos: Long ago in Babylon, the children of Judæa by their faith in the Trinity trod down the flames of the furnace, singing: Blessèd art Thou, O God of our fathers!

Being incarnate of the Virgin's womb, Thou hast come to us for our Salvation. Therefore, we acknowledge Thy Mother as the Theotokos, and we cry out to thee in an Orthodox manner: Blessèd art Thou, O God of our fathers!

Thou didst raise a Staff from the root of Jesse, O all-blessèd Virgin, from which thy Son hath blossomed forth as the Fruit of salvation unto those who sing to Him with faith: Blessèd art Thou, O God of our fathers!

Fill us all with the knowledge and divine power of Three-fold Wisdom of the Most High through the prayers of the Theotokos, who sing to Thee with faith: Blessèd art Thou, O God of our fathers!

First Canon of the Bodiless Angels

Irmos: God came down upon the Hebrew children in the fiery furnace and changed the flames into dew. Praise the works of the Lord and exalt Him throughout all ages.

Thou, O compassionate One, hast shown the immaterial essence of Thine angels to be filled with an ineffable light as they sing: Blessèd art Thou, O God, throughout all ages.

Thousands of ministering angels stand without ceasing before Him unable to endure the sight of His countenance and they cry aloud: Blessèd art Thou, O God, throughout all ages.

By a single word didst the Word create the race of angels, and having sanctified them by the Holy Spirit, Thou, O God, didst teach them to praise the Trinity forever.

Triadikon: We glorify the hypostatic and uncircumscribed nature or the Trinity: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit as we cry aloud: Blessèd art Thou, O God, throughout all ages.

Second Canon of the Bodiless Angels

Irmos: Long ago in Babylon, the children of Judæa by their faith in the Trinity trod down the flames of the furnace, singing: Blessèd art Thou, O God of our fathers!

Come, O ye people, and let us clap our hands together with the bodiless angels and let us celebrate on this most auspicious day the commemoration of the wise archangels of Christ, and let us cry aloud: Blessèd art Thou, O God of our fathers!

In days of old, Abraham, the eye-witness of God and Lot the Glorious, gave shelter to the visiting angels and found fellowship with them crying out: Holy, Holy, Holy art Thou, O God of our fathers.

Angels once appeared to Manoah the brave, and to Tobit, most wise, giving them worthy rewards for their struggles in life; and once, an angel saved the three children by quenching the flames of the fiery furnace.

Theotokion: We proclaim Thee, O Jesus as two natures in One Person, who hast taken without change, the whole of our human nature from the Virgin, and venerating Thine image, we faithfully honor Thee.

Ode 8 Canon of the Mother of God

Irmos: The King of heaven whom the hosts of heaven magnify, we praise and exalt throughout all ages.

Quench the fiery arrows of deception which the enemy launches at us, O pure one, that we may praise and exalt thee throughout all ages.

Thou gavest birth to God the Word, our Creator, and our Savior, in a manner beyond nature, O Virgin; therefore, we praise and exalt thee throughout all ages.

The unapproachable Light who had taken up His abode in thee, O Virgin, hath shown thee to be golden-rayed lamp illumining all unto all ages.

First Canon of the Bodiless Angels

Irmos: Thou didst display Thy glory upon the holy mountain revealing to Moses the mystery of the Virgin. Let us praise the Lord and exalt Him throughout all ages.

Let us emulate the life the angels and let our minds soar to the heights, that with them we may, with immaterial voices, praise the Lord, singing and exalting Him throughout all ages.

The angelic members of the heavenly choir are exceedingly joyful as they turn about the throne of God, singing and exalting Him throughout all ages.

Refrain: Most Holy Trinity, our God, glory to Thee.

Triadikon: O Holy Trinity that maketh Thine angels spirits and Thy ministers a flaming immaterial fire, we ceaselessly sing and exalt Thee throughout all ages.

Theotokion: O Theotokos, thou wast accounted worthy to hold in thy embrace Him, before whom the legions of angels and archangels in heaven stand trembling in fear. Intercede with Him that those who glorify Him throughout all ages may be saved.

Second Canon of the Bodiless Angels

Irmos: The Chaldean torturer became enraged; he ordered the furnace to be heated seven-fold; but seeing the godly youths saved by a great might, he sang to the Creator and Redeemer: Bless Him, O you children, praise Him, O ye priests, exalt Him, O ye people, throughout all ages.

The Archangel Michael, foremost among all the angels, and together with him the resplendently glorified Gabriel, the initiate of grace, who pledged the Virgin's troth, are worthily praised as they both proclaim and cry aloud: exalt Christ, O ye people throughout all ages.

Beholding all the distinct ranks of the angelic hosts, Ezekiel proclaimed foretelling: Among them stand the six-winged seraphim and the many-eyed cherubīm, forming a circle; and with them he beheld the brightly-shining archangels glorifying Christ throughout all ages.

Daniel foretold the dread coming of Thy second Coming saying: When the thrones are set and the Ancient of Days takes His seat, He shall lead in thousands of angels, present in awe and crying with perpetual voices to the Trinity throughout all ages.

Let us bless the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, the Lord!

Theotokion: One in essence as the Father and the Spirit, the Word came of His own free will to us and took from the Virgin the same form as us, not confusing the one with the other in this awesome union, for He himself was shown to be one and the same, in two natures and one person, and we now venerate the image of His likeness.

We praise, bless, and worship the Lord singing and exalting Him throughout all ages!

Ode 9 Canon of the Mother of God

Irmos: Saved through thee, O most pure Theotokos, we confess thee to be truly the Mother of our God, and together with the angels we magnify thee.

Thou dost fill our minds with joy and gladness, for thou dost grant healing to all who approach thee with faith, piously professing thee as the Theotokos.
