### The 22<sup>nd</sup> Day of January

### Commemoration of the Holy Apostle Timothy of the Seventy; and the Monk Martyr Anastasius the Persian.

### Vespers

At "Lord, I call...," 6 stichera:

**3 stichera of the Apostle, in Tone 1:** *To the melody, "O all-praised martyrs...."* 

Enlightened by the rays of the <u>Spi</u>rit, / O divinely-revealed <u>Timothy</u>, / Thou didst tra<u>verse</u> the entire earth / Like a gleaming star, illumining all with grace. /// Pray now, that our souls be granted peace and great <u>mercy</u>.

O <u>Timothy</u>, <u>wise</u> in God, / Thou didst drink from the <u>fou</u>ntain of delight, / And emulating <u>Christ</u>, thou didst <u>quench</u> the thirst / Of those who fervently <u>longed</u> for the <u>kno</u>wledge of God. / <u>Now</u>, thou hast joyfully gone to join Him / To contemplate forever the glory of the <u>Trinity</u> /// And the peace which is boundless in <u>po</u>wer.

O <u>Timothy</u>, <u>wise</u> in God, / Conversing through thy writings with thine in<u>stru</u>ctor, Paul, / Thou wast <u>radiantly</u> filled with divine light, / O zealous <u>wo</u>rker and <u>fa</u>vorite of Christ. / Living a <u>life</u> of piety and <u>cha</u>stity, /// As a worthy champ'ion thou wast vouchsafed a crown of <u>vi</u>ctory.

## And 3 stichera of the Monk Martyr, in the same Tone: (and melody)

Most-blessèd <u>fa</u>ther Ana<u>sta</u>sius, / Thou boast of the <u>ma</u>rtyrs, / Thou didst <u>raise</u> aloft thy]victories over <u>va</u>nity, And for being true to thy name, thou wast raised up as a vic<u>to</u>rious <u>ma</u>rtyr. / And <u>now</u>, we beseech thee, O Ana<u>sta</u>sius, /// That we, who faithfully honor thy mem'ry be raised up from our sinful trans<u>gr</u>essions.

Most-blessèd <u>fa</u>ther Ana<u>sta</u>sius / Thou boast of the <u>ma</u>rtyrs, /

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Thou didst <u>raise</u> aloft thy victory over <u>va</u>nity, And didst receive a double crown for thine ascetic <u>struggles</u> and <u>ma</u>rtyrdom, / For <u>waging the good fight even <u>un</u>to death; /// And Christ the Master rewarded thee with the power of working <u>mi</u>racles.</u>

O wonder<u>wo</u>rker Ana<u>sta</u>sius, / The ends of the earth now praise thy <u>mi</u>racles / With which <u>Christ</u> hath a<u>dorned</u> thee / For enduring <u>torture for</u> His sake; / And after thy <u>death</u>, he hath re<u>wa</u>rded thee /// With immortal glory and <u>ble</u>ssedness.

### **Glory..., of the Apostle, in Tone 8:**

<u>Cho</u>sen by God before time to be the disciple of the apostle Paul, / Thou didst learn of <u>things</u> divine; / And <u>living the go</u>dly life / Thou didst preserve the faith unaltered even to the <u>she</u>dding of thy blood. / Thou wast a faithful <u>hi</u>erarch of the Church; / And for denouncing the pagans, thou wast <u>bea</u>ten and stoned. / Thus thou didst receive the crown of <u>martyrdom</u>. / Therefore, O most blessèd <u>Ti</u>mothy, /// Intercede for us who faithfully celebrate thine honored <u>me</u>mory.

# **Now and ever..., Theotokion, in Tone 8, or this Stavrotheotokion, in the Same Tone:** *To the melody, "Thy martyrs...."*

Beholding her <u>Child</u> upon the Tree / As a willing <u>sa</u>crifice, / The unblemished <u>Mai</u>den wept <u>bi</u>tterly / And she cried la<u>menting</u>: / "Woe is me, my be<u>lov</u>èd Child / What hath the ungrateful <u>people done</u> to Thee? /// Wishing to leave me childless, O my be<u>lov</u>èd One."

Or Dogmatic Theotokion in the Tone of the Week if a Resurrection service.

### The Aposticha is from the Octoechos, then the Refrain:

*Verse:* The proclamation of thy teachings hath gone out into all the world and their words to the ends of the <u>un</u>iverse.

### And the following sticheron of the Apostle, in Tone 1:

# APOSTLE TIMOTHY OF THE SEVENTY; VENERABLE MARTYR ANASTASIUS THE PERSIAN

<u>Come</u>, all ye <u>people</u>, / And let us sing a <u>song</u> of praise / To <u>Ti</u>mothy the Apostle, the herald of the <u>Go</u>spel; / To him let us sing: Rejoice, thou glorious de<u>fe</u>nder of the <u>Tri</u>nity; / Rejoice, O master of the virtues and <u>prea</u>cher of the Word; / Rejoice, well-tuned harp sounding with the music of God to the <u>ends</u> of the earth; /// Rejoice, O pillar of the faith and foun<u>dation of the Church</u>!

### Glory..., to the Venerable Martyr, in Tone 2:

Thou didst magnify the power of the precious <u>Cross</u>, O Christ, / In the land of Babylon as in Ju<u>dæ</u>a; / For by <u>it</u> the people of Persia learned of the life-giving Feast of the Resur<u>re</u>ction; / By it a former prisoner of idolatry gave them their <u>free</u>dom: / Anastasius the glorious champion and martyr, rich in <u>wo</u>nders, /// Who celebrates now with the angels and inter<u>cedes</u> for our souls.

### **Now and ever..., Theotokion, in Tone 2, or this Stavrotheotokion, in Tone 2:** *To the melody, "When from the tree...."*

Enduring great pain at the crucifixion of thy <u>Son</u> and God, / Thou, O all-pure Lady, didst weep and <u>cry</u> aloud: / "Woe is me, my <u>swee</u>test Child, / How dost Thou suffer so unjustly to save the mortals born of <u>A</u>dam?" / <u>There</u>fore, O all-holy Virgin, we faithfully be<u>seech</u> thee /// To obtain for us the favor <u>of</u> Thy Son.

### The Troparion of the Apostle Timothy, in Tone 4:

Having learned goodness <u>tho</u>roughly / And being sober in <u>all</u> things / Clothed in a good <u>conscience</u> as befits the <u>holy</u> / Thou didst draw ineffable wisdom from the chosen <u>ve</u>ssel, Paul / And having <u>kept</u> the faith / Thou hast completed the same course, O Apostle <u>Ti</u>mothy. /// Intercede with Christ God that our souls <u>may</u> be saved.

### The Troparion of the Monk Martyr Anastasius, in the same Tone:

Thy martyr Anastasius, O Lord, /

Through his sufferings received his incorruptible crown from <u>Thee</u>, our God. / For having Thy strength he laid low his <u>e</u>nemies /

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And shattered the powerless boldness of <u>demons</u> /// Through his intercessions, O Christ God, <u>save</u> our souls.

### Matins

### One Canon from the Octoechos, with 6 Troparia, including the Irmos; and two Canons of the Saints, with 8 Troparia each.

Come, O ye <u>fai</u>thful, and let us praise Timothy the holy a<u>po</u>stle / The companion of Paul in his <u>tra</u>vels; / And to<u>ge</u>ther with him, let us honor the wise Ana<u>sta</u>sius / Who came from <u>Persia like</u> a star /// For the healing of our souls' passions and our bodies' di<u>sea</u>ses.
