Vespers

At "Lord, I call...," 3 stichera, in Tone 8: To the melody, "What shall we call thee?..."

What shall we call thee, O <u>glo</u>rious one? / An offering from Greece, as thou didst <u>hail</u> from there? / The cleansing of Phœnicia, as <u>thou</u> wast <u>sacrificed</u> there? / A candle burning brightly amidst the <u>darkness</u>? / Valiant, in that thou remained invincible in thy <u>sufferings</u>? / Far-reaching are thy fame and glory, O <u>ble</u>ssèd Le<u>o</u>ntius. /// Pray now, that our souls may be saved.

What shall we call thee, O passion-bearing <u>martyr</u>? / Soldier of Christ, for thou didst defeat His <u>enemies</u>? / Ruler of the passions, for thou didst suffer for the <u>sake</u> of <u>piety</u>? / Feeder of the hungry, for thou didst love the <u>needy</u> and the poor? / Righteous, for thou wast a zealot of heavenly <u>wisdom</u>? / Many were thy sufferings and great were thy <u>struggles</u>, O Le<u>o</u>ntius. /// Pray now, that our <u>souls</u> may be saved.

<u>Who</u> shall not marvel at thee, O martyr Le<u>o</u>ntius? / For, as an inhabitant of heaven, thou didst receive from the fount of incor<u>ruption</u> / And now rivers of grace pour forth from <u>thee</u> upon the <u>faithful</u> / For thou freely givest drink to <u>those</u> who thirst / Communing them with the <u>wa</u>ters of grace. /// Pray now, that our <u>souls</u> may be saved.

Glory..., in Tone 1:

O most-<u>praised martyr Leóntius</u>, /
Neither the flames, nor mutilations, nor the sword could separate thee from the <u>love</u> of Christ /
For having <u>suffered</u> bravely at the hands of thy tor<u>mentors</u> /
Thou didst destroy the offerings <u>made</u> to <u>i</u>dols. /
Rejoicing <u>now</u> in the mansions of heaven, O wise and victorious Le<u>ontius</u>, ///
Earnestly pray that our souls may be saved.

Now and ever..., Theotokion, or this Stavrotheotokion in the same Tone: To the

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melody, "Joy of the ranks of heaven "

Standing before the Cross of thy Son and God, / And beholding His long-suffering, O pure Mother, thou didst cry out weeping: / Woe is me, O my Child most sweet! / What are these things which Thou dost suffer unjustly, /// O Word of God, that Thou mightest save mankind?'

Or Dogmatic Theotokion if a Resurrection service.

At the Aposticha, the stichera from the Octoechos, and then,

Glory..., in Tone 4:

Let the heavens brightly rejoice today / And let the earth be <u>glad</u> in faith / At the <u>me</u>mory of the martyr Leontius, / For on this day he was crowned not with a silent <u>sacrifice</u> / But with spiritual flowers — the <u>words</u> of praise. / And standing now with us, thus a<u>dorned</u>, / He fervently serves the innocent <u>offering</u> to the Lord, / And prays that those who celebrate his <u>me</u>mory with faith /// May attain to the courts of <u>pa</u>radise.

Now and ever..., Theotokion, or this Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone: *To the melody, "As one valiant among the martyrs...."*

Beholding Christ, who loveth mankind, <u>crucified</u>, / His side <u>pierced</u> by a spear, / The all-<u>pure</u> one, cried aloud, la<u>menting</u>: / 'What is this, <u>O</u> my Son? / How have these thankless people re<u>wa</u>rded Thee / For all the good things Thou hast <u>done</u> for them? / Dost Thou hasten to leave me childless, O most be<u>lo</u>vèd Son? /// I marvel, O Compassionate One, at Thy voluntary crucifixion!'

The Troparion of the Saint, in Tone 4:
