Vespers

At "Lord, I call...," 6 stichera:

3 stichera of the Martyrs, in Tone 4: *To the melody, "As one valiant among the martyrs...."*

Thy body was pierced by <u>weapons</u> of iron, / Cruelly flogged with <u>lea</u>ther whips, / And thou wast <u>burned</u> by the <u>flaming</u> fire; / Still thou didst not deny the saving <u>name</u> of Christ, / Nor didst thou waver in thy <u>cour</u>age of mind , / Nor didst thou make sacrifice to <u>i</u>dols; / But thou didst make thyself a willing whole-burnt <u>o</u>ffering, / And a most perfect <u>sa</u>crifice /// To thy Master, O martyr <u>Mē</u>nas.

Thine eyes were plucked out, and thou wast <u>hanged</u> on a tree, / Thy whole body was branded and covered with <u>welts</u> and sores / And thy <u>sinews</u> were cruelly cut by the <u>raging</u> judge / Who then severed thy <u>head</u> with a sword; / Then didst thou rejoice, O Victor, the <u>glo</u>rious, / Thou passion-bearer of the <u>Sa</u>vior / For thou didst vanquish the legions of the <u>enemy</u> /// By the power and action of the Holy <u>Spi</u>rit.

The Lord awarded thee a <u>crown</u> of grace, / O greatly suffering <u>Stephanie</u>, / For with the <u>greatest spiritual courage</u> / Thou didst willingly submit thyself to a <u>cruel death</u>: / Tied between two palm trees that were bent <u>down</u> to the ground / At their release thy body wast <u>torn</u> in two / And like a released sparrow thou didst take <u>flight</u> to God /// Leaving only thy flesh in the bloody hands of the tormentors, O glorious <u>martyr</u>!

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And 3 stichera of the Venerable Saint, in Tone 8: *To the melody, "O most glorious wonder...."*

<u>True</u> to thy name, O father <u>Theodore</u>, / Thou didst receive gifts from <u>heaven</u> / That surpassed all understanding. / Then thou didst piously share them with those who <u>loved</u> thee; / Thus increasing the talent given thee, O <u>ble</u>ssed one, / And thou didst hear the voice of God calling <u>thee</u> to His <u>presence</u>, / Where thou dost now abide forever before the throne of the <u>King</u> of all, /// O truly wondrous <u>Theodore</u>.

O <u>fa</u>ther of fathers, <u>Theodore</u>, / Thou didst bring a multitude of mo<u>na</u>stics to Christ / Thus becoming a <u>cause</u> of their sal<u>va</u>tion, / Illumined with doctrines and revealed, prophetically, to be the <u>mouth</u> of the Lord. / Standing now before Him, re<u>me</u>mber us all, /// O all-wise father <u>Theodore</u>.

The abundant grace of the Spirit / Was clearly poured <u>out</u> onto thy lips, / O wise <u>minister</u> of the <u>mysteries</u>, / And a torrent of divine teaching flowed <u>forth</u> from thee / Revealing thee as a champion of <u>piety</u> / And a zealous <u>teacher of</u> the Truth, / A pillar and fortress of the <u>O</u>rthodox Faith, /// And an excellent rule of the monastic life, O wise father <u>The</u>odore.

Glory..., of the Martyrs, Tone 6:

The yearly commemoration of your <u>feast</u> has come / O ye <u>beacons</u> of the world, / Holy martyrs Mēnas, Victor, Vincent, and <u>Stephanie</u> / Who enlighten the hearts of the <u>fai</u>thful / By your struggles for the <u>Lord</u> and His Cross. / Therefore, in hymns we praise <u>Christ</u> our God, /// Who hath crowned you with glory and honor.

Now and ever..., Theotokion, in the same Tone, or the Stavrotheotokion: *To the melody, To the melody, "On the third day...."*

When the Virgin, Thy pure <u>Mo</u>ther, / Beheld Thee unjustly nailed to the Tree by <u>la</u>wless men /

Her womb, O Savior was <u>wou</u>nded, /// As Symeon <u>had</u> foretold.

Or Dogmatic Theotokion in the Tone of the Week if a Resurrection service.

The Aposticha from the Octoechos,

And this sticheron to the Martyrs, in Tone 2:

Verse: Many are the afflictions of the righteous, and the Lord will deliver them out of them all.

Come all ye that love the <u>martyrs</u> / And let us honor this thrice-<u>ra</u>diant choir: / The martyrs <u>Mē</u>nas, with Victor, and <u>Vincent.</u> / For they purchased eternal life with the <u>price</u> of their blood / And with their words they opposed author of <u>evil</u>: / Saying, "<u>We</u> shall not prefer corruptible things to the incor<u>ruptible</u>; / We shall not do battle for an earthly and <u>mortal king</u>, / But we shall <u>fight</u> for the eternal living King who ceaselessly calls to the <u>faithful</u>: /// 'He that believeth in Me, though he were dead, yet <u>shall</u> he live!'"

Glory..., of St. Theodore, in Tone 6:

O ven'rable father <u>Theodore</u> / Thine instructions have gone out into <u>all</u> the earth; / Destroying the legions of <u>demons</u>; / By this thou hast found the reward of thy labors in <u>heaven</u>; / And attained to the ranks of the <u>angels</u>, / Whose life thou didst blamelessly <u>emulate</u>. / And having great boldness before <u>Christ</u> God /// Entreat Him that peace be granted <u>to</u> our souls.

Now and ever..., Theotokion, or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone: *To the melody, "On the third day...."*

Beholding Thee <u>cru</u>cified, O Christ / She who gave Thee birth cried <u>out</u> to <u>Thee</u>: / "What is this strange mystery I <u>see</u>, my Son? / How, being hung in the flesh, the <u>Gi</u>ver of Life, /// Dost Thou <u>die</u> on the Tree?"

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The General Troparion of the Martyrs, in Tone 4:

Thy holy <u>ma</u>rtyrs, O Lord, / Through their sufferings received their incorruptible crowns from <u>Thee</u>, our God' / For having Thy strength they laid low their <u>enemies</u> / And shattered the powerless boldness of <u>demons</u>. /// Through their intercessions, O Christ God, <u>save</u> our souls.

Glory..., the General Troparion of the Saint, in Tone 8

As an instructor of Orthodoxy, a teacher of piety and <u>pu</u>rity, / A lamp of the universe, and divinely-inspired enrichment of mo<u>na</u>stics, / O most wise Theodore, by thy teachings thou didst en<u>lighten all</u> /// O spirit-filled voice, beseech Christ God that our <u>souls</u> may be saved.

Now and ever..., Theotokion.

After the Third Ode, the Kontakion of St. Theodore, in Tone 2:

Thine a<u>scé</u>tic life, equal to that of the <u>angels</u> / Was illumined through thy struggles and <u>suffering</u>, / And thou wast re<u>vealed</u> to dwell together with them, O Theodore, <u>bléss't</u> by God. /// Cease not to beseech Christ God together with <u>them</u>, on be<u>half</u> of us all.

Ikos: Let us now praise Theodore, the radiant beauty of the ascetics and the confirmation of the Church of Christ; for he hath appeared as a new pillar of fire burning the heads of heretics and enlightening the souls of those who believe in the Orthodox Faith, leading them to Jerusalem on high, the city of God, as another Israel. So, let us cry out to him: O most blessed father Theodore, cease not to beseech Christ God on behalf of us all.

And the Sessional Hymn of the Martyrs, in Tone 8: To the melody, "Of wisdom...."

Thou didst shine forth from the land of Egypt, O wise martyr Menas,

Which once was held fast by the cruel darkness of <u>ignorance</u> /

As a great beacon to <u>all</u> the world, /

And the rays of thy divine struggles dispersed the night of godlessness. /

Therefore, we joyfully celebrate thy holy and light-bearing festival today, /

Glory..., of St. Theodore, in Tone 3: *To the melody, "The faith divine...."*

Enriched by the divine <u>do</u>ctrines, / Thou didst hold fast to the <u>O</u>rthodox Faith; / And thou didst brave dangers <u>for</u> its sake, / Suffering both scourging and im<u>prisonment</u>. / O our venerable father <u>The</u>odore, /// Entreat God that He may grant us <u>all great mercy</u>.

Now, and ever..., Theotokion, in the same Tone:

Thou art the divine tabernacle <u>of</u> the Word , / O only most pure Virgin <u>Mo</u>ther of God / Surpassing even the angels in thy <u>pu</u>rity. / Cleanse me with the waters of thy tears, O <u>Lady</u>, / For more than any others I am dust, defiled by my trans<u>gressions</u> /// And grant me thy great <u>mercy</u>, O <u>pure</u> one.

Or, the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone:

When the chaste ewe-lamb and incorrupt Virgin Mother, / Beheld Him hanging on the Cross / The One who sprang forth from her womb without <u>gi</u>ving pain / She cried out lamenting with a mothers' <u>so</u>rrow: / "Woe is me, <u>O</u> my Child, / How dost Thou voluntarily endure <u>suffering</u> / In Thy desire to save <u>mankind</u> /// From the <u>passion of impiety</u>.

After the Sixth Ode, the Kontakion of the Martyrs, in Tone 4: *To the melody, "Thou hast appeared today...."*

O passion-bearing martyr <u>Mē</u>nas, / Thou didst leave behind the <u>a</u>rmy on earth / And wast <u>made</u> a member of the army of <u>hea</u>ven / By <u>Christ</u> our God, /// Himself, the unfading Crown of the <u>ma</u>rtyrs.

Ikos: The memory of the martyrs brings great joy to us for it shows forth their

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courage amidst their suffering and their victory over the enemy in a radiant and joyful confession of grace. Come therefore, all ye that love this feast, and let us rejoice and be glad keeping the memory of the passion-bearer Mēnas, as the better and more perfect of all joys, that we may find the end of our passions to be a gift given to us by Christ our God, the unfading Crown of the martyrs.

Exapostilarion from the Octoechos, and that of the Martyrs:

The stars adorn the heavens, and the martyrs Mēnas, Victor, Vincent and Stephanida adorn the Church. Grant Orthodox Christians victory over their adversaries for their sake, O Jesus.

Glory..., the Exapostilarion of St. Theodore:

Thou wast revealed to be a living fortress of the dogmas of Orthodoxy, denouncing the deceptions of the iconoclasts. Wherefore, having ended thy time of witness by thy suffering, thou hast been glorified, O father Theodore.

Now and ever..., Theotokion.

All we, the faithful, have thee as our mediatrix before Him who was born of thee and crucified for us. Wherefore, cease not to intercede for us, O Virgin.

Verse: The righteous cried and the Lord heard them and He delivered them from all their troubles.

Come all ye <u>fai</u>thful, / And let us honor Mēnas the glorious passion-<u>bea</u>rer of Christ, / Who was <u>mighty</u> in battle and steadfast in <u>piety</u>, / And cast down the dominion of the rulers and the <u>ty</u>rants. / And as he hath great boldness before <u>Christ</u> our God /// He ceaselessly prays to Him that our <u>soúls</u> may be saved.

Glory..., of St. Theodore, in Tone 8:

We <u>honor thee as the instructor of a multitude of monastics</u>, / O our father <u>Theodore</u>; / For truly we have learned to walk aright by <u>following in</u> thy steps. / Blessed art thou, for having <u>labored</u> for Christ, / Thou hast destroyed the power of the <u>enemy</u>, / O converser with the angels and com<u>panion of the righteous</u>, /// Pray with them to the Lord that He grant our souls great <u>mercy</u>.

The Prokeimenon, in Tone 4: The Lord has shown the wonders of His will / to the saints who are in His land. *Verse:* I keep the Lord always before me; for He is at my right hand, and I shall not be moved.

The Alleluia, in Tone 4: The righteous cried and the Lord heard them, and He delivered them from all their troubles. *Verse:* Many are the afflictions of the righteous, and the Lord will deliver them out of them all.

The Gospel: (38) Matthew 10:32-33, 37-38, 19:27-30 (Martyrs); and (10) Matthew 4:25-5:12 (Saint).

Communion Hymn: Rejoice in the Lord, O ye righteous! Praise befits the just! Alleluia....

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
