The 4th Day of August The Seven Holy Youths (Seven Sleepers) of Ephesus.

Vespers

At "Lord, I call...," 3 stichera, in Tone 1: To the melody, "Joy of the ranks of heaven...."

<u>Come</u>, and let us ever praise the <u>me</u>mory / Of the seven-<u>ci</u>rcled light / Which <u>shone</u> upon the seven <u>wo</u>rthy youths, / And let us cry out to <u>Christ</u>, Who hath so <u>crowned</u> them: / Through their <u>prayers</u>, grant <u>peace</u> to our lives, /// O Lord, our Redeemer.

The <u>seven go</u>dly youths / Who were dead according to the laws of <u>na</u>ture / Truly <u>rose</u> together, as if from sleep, surpassing <u>na</u>ture. / O most <u>awe</u>some <u>wo</u>nder! / For three <u>hu</u>ndred and <u>se</u>venty-two years /// They had slept in a cave as <u>if</u> they were dead!

Let us now <u>praise</u> the divine <u>Iam</u>blicus, / Maximillian, Mar<u>ti</u>nian and John, / Anto<u>ni</u>nus and Dio<u>ny</u>sius, / For they <u>ever pray</u> for us, / And <u>with</u> them, let us <u>pi</u>ously praise /// Exacustodian the wise.

Note: But if we sing "Alleluia" at the Matins instead of "God is the Lord," then the following 3 stichera to the Theotokos are sung at Vespers, at "Lord I call," before the above stichera of the Saints, in the same Tone and melody:

Most <u>glo</u>rified art thou from generation to gene<u>ra</u>tion, / O Virgin Mother and Maiden, Mary the <u>Mo</u>ther of God, / The inter<u>ce</u>ssor <u>for</u> the world, / Thou gavest <u>birth</u> in the flesh to the Son of the Unoriginate <u>Fa</u>ther / Truly of One Essence with the <u>Spi</u>rit. /// Pray to Him that we <u>may</u> be saved

<u>We</u> who are hopelessly possessed by sins, O <u>pure</u> one, / Have thee alone as our intercessor, O <u>Virgin</u>. / And we <u>gra</u>tefully cry <u>out</u> to thee: / Cleanse us, O most <u>holy bride</u> of God. /

4 AUGUST

For <u>thou</u>, art the <u>ref</u>uge of the world /// And the defender of the race of <u>mankind</u>.

<u>Tossed</u> about by the <u>storm</u> of my sins, / I flee to the calm haven of thy prayers, O <u>Mo</u>ther of God, / <u>And</u> I cry <u>out</u> to thee: / Stretch out thy mighty right hand to <u>me</u>, thy <u>se</u>rvant /// And save me, O most <u>pure</u> one!

Glory..., now and ever..., Theotokion, in the same Tone:

Armed with the <u>staff</u> of thy protection, O most pure <u>Mo</u>ther of God, / Drive away the beastly passions of mine a<u>ccu</u>rsèd soul; / And di<u>rect</u> my <u>life</u> in peace /// And number me among thy chosen <u>flock</u> of sheep.

Or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone:

<u>Standing before the Cross of thy Son</u> and God, / And beholding His long-<u>suffering</u>, O pure <u>Mother</u>, thou didst cry out <u>weeping</u>: / Woe is me, O my <u>Child most</u> sweet! / What are these <u>things</u> which Thou dost suffer unjustly, /// O Word of God, that Thou mightest <u>save</u> mankind?'

Or Dogmatic Theotokion if a Resurrection service.

The General Troparion of Martyrs, or this one of the Saints, in Tone 4:

O great <u>mi</u>racle of faith, / The seven holy youths re<u>mained</u> in a cave / As if in a royal <u>palace</u> / And died without cor<u>ruption</u>. / After a long time they a<u>rose</u> as from sleep, / Confirming the resurrection of <u>all</u> mankind. /// Through their prayers, O Christ God, have <u>me</u>rcy on us.

Matins

Both Canons from the Octoechos, and that of the Saints, with 4 Troparia, in Tone 2:

Kontakion of the Saints, in Tone 4:

Spurning the cor<u>ru</u>ption of this world / And accepting the gifts of incor<u>ru</u>ption, / Though the seven youths died they were not touched by cor<u>ru</u>ption; / And they arose after many years thus burying the unbelief of the <u>wi</u>cked. /// Therefore, let us the faithful praise them as we <u>glo</u>rify Christ.

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
