## **Vespers**

# At "Lord, I call...," 6 stichera: 3 stichera to the Martyrs, in Tone 8: To the melody, "O most glorious wonder...." O most-glorious martyrs of Christ, / You withstood being seized by secular insanity of this world / Which drew the world into the pit of transgressions. / You did not cleave to the ungodly nor did you leave the true path / But suffered bravely and were put to death by the sword, /// And received true life as your inheritance. Let us <u>fai</u>thfully honor the nine-fold choir of martyrs: / Theógenes, Rufus, and Antipater, / Ártemas, Theóstichus, Magnus and Theodotus, / The glorious Thaumásius and Philēmon, the godly / Who shone radiantly in their sufferings /// And enlightened all who sat in darkness. O beautiful bouquet of martyrs, / A sacred band united in holiness / And congregation formed by the command of God, / O holy choir and blessèd company / That fought for the One God in three Persons, /// Entreat the Holy Trinity for us, that we may receive remission of our sins. And 3 stichera to St. Memnon, in the same Tone: (and melody) O ven'rable and blessèd father Memnon, / Having cleansed thy soul with abstinence / And becoming a pure and beautiful dwelling of the Spirit, / Thou drivest evil spirits away / Always healing the infirmities of those who run to thee. /// Beseech Christ on behalf of us who praise thee. O ven'rable and glorious father Memnon, / Having controlled the passions of the soul / And becoming an instructor of monastics, / Fervently didst thou anoint them to ascetic labors /

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And present them to the All-seeing Word. /
And having lived a blessèd life keeping pure from every offense ///
With them, remember us now who praise thee.
O ven'rable and most-bountiful father Memnon, /
Once thou didst cause a fountain to spring /
For the glory of the Lord and for the benefit of our souls. /
Ships in peril are saved from the depths of the sea /
And, by thy prayers, men are saved from hunger and the plague. /
Many wonders are wrought by thee, O glorious one. ///
Beseech Christ on behalf of us who praise thee.
Glory..., now and ever..., Theotokion, from the Pentecostarion or this
Theotokion, in the same Tone: (and melody)
The pre-eternal God became incarnate of thee, /
O most pure Lady, /
Revealing thee as the intercessor for mankind. /
Therefore, deliver us, thy servants /
From every tribulation and sorrow /
Brought on by the wiles of the enemy; /
So that ever glorifying and honoring thee ///
We may come to partake of the splendors of the chosen ones.
Or this Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone: (and melody)
Beholding Thee, O Jesus, <u>nailed</u> to the Cross /
And accepting suffering of Thine own will, /
The Virgin, Thy Mother, O Master, cried aloud: /
"Woe is me, O my sweet Child! /
How is it that Thou dost endure unjust wounding, /
O Physician who healeth the infirmities of mankind ///
And by Thy loving-kindness dost deliver all from corruption?"
Or Dogmatic Theotokion if a Resurrection service.
The General Troparion of the Martyrs, in Tone 4: (None given in the Menaion)
Thy holy martyrs, O Lord, /
Through their sufferings received their incorruptible crowns from Thee, our God. /
For having Thy strength they laid low their enemies /
And shattered the powerless boldness of demons. ///
Through their intercessions, O Christ God, save our souls.

After the Sixth Ode, the Kontakion of the Martyrs, Tone 2: To the melody, "Seeking the highest...."

The <u>stea</u>dfast and glorious choir of the nine <u>martyrs</u>, /
The confessors of the triune-radiance of the <u>Tri</u>nity /
Cried a<u>loud</u> at the beginning of their trial: /
We offer to Thee as a pure sacrifice our blood, our souls, and <u>bo</u>dies, /
And as <u>Thou</u> art our <u>mer</u>ciful God, ///
Number us a<u>mong</u> Thy <u>hea</u>venly choirs.

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
