Vespers

At "Lord, I call...," 6 stichera:

3 stichera of St. John, in Tone 4: *To the melody, "Thou hast given a sign...."*

Thou didst emulate the compassion of the merciful <u>Ma</u>ster, / O wondrous <u>fa</u>ther John, / Thou didst di<u>stri</u>bute thy bread to the needy in charity, O <u>ho</u>ly one. / Therefore, thy memory abides truly, fo<u>re</u>ver, / And those who celebrate it with faith are delivered from trials and af<u>fli</u>ctions, /// O most richly-bless't <u>hi</u>erarch John.

When He who sees ev'ry <u>secret thing</u> / Beheld the purity and <u>rightness</u> of thy mind, / And the inspired <u>nature</u> of thy character and <u>way</u> of life / He anointed thee with myrrh and elevated thee to a magnificent throne / And entrusted thee with the <u>gui</u>dance of thy flock /// Which thou didst lead to the harbor of divine grace, O holy <u>fa</u>ther John.

The Lord granted thee all the prayers of thy heart, O truly <u>wo</u>ndrous one, / For thou didst keep all His saving com<u>ma</u>ndments. / <u>Truly</u>, thou didst love God with thy entire being and thy <u>neighbor</u> as thyself / And thou didst give help to those in need, O thou who art <u>bless't</u> by God, /// Therefore, we honor thee today, O holy <u>fa</u>ther John.

And 3 stichera of St. Nilus, in Tone 8: To the melody, "What shall we call thee?...."

What shall we call thee, O holy one? / A river flowing from the spiritual <u>pa</u>radise? / A channel carrying to us the many <u>gifts</u> provided by God? / A flowing tide filled with the <u>tea</u>chings of grace? / A vessel of wisdom, divine knowledge and under<u>standing</u>? / A fervent instructor and an <u>a</u>rdent inter<u>ce</u>ssor? /// Pray now that our <u>souls</u> may be saved!

What <u>name</u> shall we give thee, O <u>ven</u>'rable one? / Worker in the grove of immor<u>tal</u>ity? / Blessèd gardener of the <u>spi</u>ritual <u>pa</u>radise? / Learnèd student of the <u>laws</u> of God? /

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Teacher of the <u>do</u>ctrines divine? / Or the unmatched e<u>xa</u>mple of <u>pi</u>ety? /// Pray now that our souls may be saved!

<u>How</u> shall we describe thee, O <u>wo</u>ndrous one? / As the one who laid down the guidelines for <u>marital life?</u> / Or as the one who taught us the <u>laws</u> of <u>chastity?</u> / Teacher of monastics, or the instructor of the laity in the ways of <u>co</u>njugal life? / For in thy life thou hast mastered and <u>ba</u>lanced both, / And thy many ascetic ac<u>co</u>mplishments were <u>plea</u>sing to God. /// Pray now that our <u>souls</u> may be saved!

Glory..., of St. John, in Tone 2: (by Anatalius)

John, the great emu<u>la</u>tor of Christ, The shepherd and luminary of Alexandria, and the wellspring of <u>mercies</u> / Over<u>flo</u>wed with compassionate kindness to <u>those</u> in need. / Come, and let us the poor in spirit, be filled as we imitate his pious tran<u>quility</u>, / For with love and com<u>pa</u>ssion he offered hospitality to Christ by <u>we</u>lcoming the poor / And like Abraham of old, he was counted worthy of <u>ble</u>ssedness /// And intercedes with boldness that our souls be granted great <u>me</u>rcy.

Now and ever..., Theotokion or this Stavrotheotokion in the same Tone: *To the melody, "Down from the tree...."*

Beholding thee, O Jesus, nailed to the wood of the Cross, / She who know not wedlock cried out weeping: / "O sweet Child, Thou Unapproachable Light of the All-unoriginate Father, / Why hast Thou left me alone, who gave birth to Thee? But hasten Thou and glorify Thyself /// That they who glorify Thy divine sufferings may receive divine glory!"

Or the Dogmatic Theotokion in the Tone of the Week if a Resurrection service.

The Aposticha from the Octoechos and then:

Glory..., of St. Nilus, in Tone 8:

We <u>honor thee as the instructor of a multitude of monastics</u>, / O our father <u>Ni</u>lus; / For truly we have learned to walk aright by <u>following in</u> thy steps. / Blessèd art thou, for having <u>labored</u> for Christ, / Thou hast destroyed the power of the <u>enemy</u>, / O converser with the angels and companion of the righteous, /// Pray with them to the Lord that He may grant our souls great mercy.

Now and ever..., Theotokion or this Stavrotheotokion in the same Tone:

Beholding Thee, O Jesus, <u>nailed</u> to the Cross / And accepting suffering of Thine <u>own</u> will, / The Virgin, Thy Mother, O <u>Master</u>, <u>cried</u> aloud: / "Woe is me, O my <u>sweet</u> Child! / How is it that Thou dost endure unjust <u>wounding</u>, / O Physician who healeth the in<u>fi</u>rmities of <u>mankind</u> /// And by Thy loving-kindness dost deliver all from cor<u>ruption</u>?"

The Troparion of St. John the Almsgiver, in Tone 8:

In thy patience didst thou gain thy reward, O holy <u>fa</u>ther, / Thou didst persevere in ceaseless prayer and didst love and <u>help</u> the poor. /// O blesséd John the merciful almsgiver, entreat Christ God that He may <u>save</u> our souls.

Glory..., the Troparion of St. Nilus, in the same Tone:

Thine abundant tears made the wilderness <u>sprout</u> and bloom / And thy suffering made thy labors fruitful a <u>hundredfold</u> / Thou hast become a shining torch over <u>all</u> the world /// O our holy father Nilus, pray to Christ God that He may <u>save</u> our souls.

Matins

One Canon from the Octoechos and two for the Saints — *incomplete as of 10/2014*

After the Third Ode, the Kontakion of St. Nilus, in Tone 8:

Thou didst destroy the passions of thy body, O <u>Ni</u>lus, / Cutting through them with self-denial and vigilant prayer as <u>with</u> a scythe; / And since thou hast boldness before the Lord, set us free from every ca<u>la</u>mity /// That we may cry out, Rejoice, our earthly father, <u>wise</u> in God.

After the Sixth Ode, the Kontakion of St. John, in Tone 2:

Thou didst dis<u>tri</u>bute thy <u>wealth</u> to the poor, / Thereby receiving heavenly riches, O John most-wise, / Therefore, we <u>honor</u> thee and celebrate thy holy <u>memory</u>, /// As the namesake of alms<u>gi</u>ving and <u>cha</u>rity.

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
