Our Venerable Fathers Hilarion the New, Abbot of Pelekete, and Stephen the Wonderworker of Triglia.

Vespers

At "Lord, I call...," 6 stichera,

3 stichera of St. Hilarion in Tone 4: ¹ *To the melody, "Thou hast given a sign...."*

Having acquired a chaste life, O <u>fa</u>ther, / Patience, meekness, and sin<u>cere</u> love, / Extreme <u>abstinence</u>, and standing all <u>night</u> in prayer, / Divíne compunction, true <u>faith</u> and hope, / Thou didst live on earth as an <u>angel</u> in the flesh /// O blessèd Hilarion, inter<u>ce</u>ssor for our souls.

Thou didst shine forth, O <u>ve</u>n'rable one / As an earthly angel and <u>hea</u>venly man, / A <u>fou</u>ntain of compunction, a stream of compassion, a sea of <u>mi</u>racles, / The surety of sinners, a worthy and fruitful <u>ol</u>ive tree of God, / Anointing the faces of those who faithfully <u>praise</u> thee /// With the oil of thy labors, O father Hi<u>la</u>rion.

Enlightened with divine under<u>standing</u>, / Thy mind overcame bodily <u>passions</u> / By not participating in earthly <u>matters</u> / But bearing in thyself the imprint of divine <u>goo</u>dness, / Thou art seen as godlike by all through the grace of the Divine <u>Spi</u>rit /// O our father Hilarion, thou adornment of mo<u>na</u>stics.

And 3 stichera of St. Stephen, in the same Tone: To the melody, "As one valiant among the martyrs...."

[If at Presanctified, these stichera are sung at the Praises of Matins.]

Being the <u>tru</u>est monk, / The brightest star and a fountain of com<u>punction</u>, / Thou wast re<u>vea</u>led as one <u>filled</u> with love, / Meekness, tranquility, compassion and hu<u>mi</u>lity, / Without guile and blameless, O father <u>Stephen</u>, ///

Therefore Christ placed thee as a shepherd of monastics, honored by miracles.

Awake all night in keeping <u>vigil</u>, / And with ineffable abstinence, O venerable <u>fa</u>ther, / With a <u>go</u>dly life, fervent prayer, faith, hope and sin<u>ce</u>rity, / Thou didst possess wondrous endurance and Orthodox <u>wi</u>sdom; / And thou didst shine with divine radiance be<u>fore</u> thy repose. /// Therefore we honor thee, O venerable <u>Stephen</u>.

We praise thee, O <u>fath</u>er, /

As a brilliant star, a never-waning sun, a shimmering <u>heaven</u> / A<u>dorned</u> with stars and divine <u>wo</u>nders / As a garden of fragrant flowers, the delight of <u>pa</u>radise, / A fountain of sanctifi<u>ca</u>tion, / As a great physician bringing <u>hea</u>ling to the sick, /// As our good shepherd and intercessor, O father <u>Stephen</u>.

Glory... now and ever..., Theotokion in the same Tone: (and melody)

Shower my thoughts with the dew of the Most Holy <u>Spi</u>rit, / O most pure <u>Mo</u>ther of Christ, / Who in His <u>boundless compassion</u>, / Cleansed the multitude of our transgressions with a <u>drop</u> of dew. / Dry up the source of my <u>passions</u>, / And through thy prayers, O <u>Lady</u>, /// Vouchsafe that I may ever drink at the <u>stream</u> of life.

Or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone: (and melody)

Seeing Thee nailed to the <u>Cross</u>, O Lord, / The ewe-lamb, Thy Mother, cried out in a<u>ma</u>zement: / "<u>What</u> is this sight, O most-de<u>si</u>red Son? / What has the ungrateful assembly <u>done</u> to Thee / Having once delighted themselves in Thy many <u>mi</u>racles? /// But I glorify Thy ineffable condescension, O Master!"

Or Dogmatic Theotokion if a Resurrection service.

Note: No Troparion or Kontakion for either Saint given in the Slav Menaion.

VEN. HILARION THE NEW & STEPHEN THE WONDERWORKER

The Troparion of St. Hilarion, Tone 5: (to the melody: "Let us the faithful...)

A<u>dorned</u> with <u>gla</u>dness of soul, / A pure vessel of the <u>wi</u>sdom of Christ, / Thou wast a <u>mo</u>del of the <u>life</u> in God. / <u>There</u>fore, thou art resplendent with the light of the <u>vi</u>rtues, / O father Hil<u>a</u>rion, /// Guiding us unerringly to the sal<u>va</u>tion <u>of</u> our souls.

The Troparion of St. Stephen, Tone 8:

As an instructor of Orthodoxy, a teacher of piety and <u>pu</u>rity, / A lamp of the universe, and divinely-inspired enrichment of <u>hi</u>erarchs, / O most-wise Cosmas, by thy teachings thou didst en<u>lighten all</u> /// O spirit-filled voice, beseech Christ God to <u>save</u> our souls.

Matins

The Canon of Saint Hilarion, Tone 2,

having the acrostic: "I praise thy silent virtues, O venerable father," the composition of Joseph.

The Canon for Saint Stephen, Tone 1,

having the acrostic: "I honor thy divine labors, O blessed one." The composition of Joseph.

The Kontakion of St. Hilarion, Tone 4:

O righteous father Hilarion, / Thou didst blossom lie the fruitful <u>o</u>live tree, / Making radiant with the mystical <u>po</u>wer of thine oil / All the faithful who loving <u>sing</u> to thee: /// "Rejoice, unwavering rule of the <u>righteous</u>!"

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
