# The 11th Day of January Afterfeast of Theophany; Commemoration of our Venerable Father, Theodosius, Founder of the Cœnobitic Life. Vespers At "Lord, I call...," 8 stichera. A Vigil may be served if so desired by the Superior or the Rector. Note: Note: If this day falls on the **Sunday After Theophany**, then at "Lord, I call..." we sing 10 stichera: 4 of the Resurrection, followed by 3 of the Feast, 3 of St. Theodosius. **3 stichera of the Feast, in Tone 2:** (by the monk, John of Damascus — from 7 Jan.) When the Forerunner beheld our Enlightenment, / The Light that enlighteneth all, / Coming to be baptized / His hand trembled and his soul rejoiced; / And he proclaimed to the people: / "This is the Savior of Israel, who delivereth us from corruption." /// O Christ our God, the only sinless One, glory to Thee! The hosts of angels trembled in fear, / When they beheld Thee baptized by a servant; / And the Holy Spirit, bore witness to Thee, O Savior, / And the voice of the Father was heard from heaven: / "This One on whom the Forerunner lays his hand, / Is My beloved Son in whom I am well pleased." /// O Christ our God, glory to Thee! ## **Three Readings:**

## The Reading from the Wisdom of Solomon (5:15-6:3):

5:15...The righteous live for evermore; their reward also is with the Lord. and the care of them is with the most High. <sup>16</sup>Therefore shall they receive a glorious kingdom and a beautiful crown from the Lord's hand; for with His right hand shall He cover them, and with His arm shall He protect them. <sup>17</sup>He shall take to him His zeal for complete armor and make the creation His weapon for revenge upon his enemies. <sup>18</sup>He shall put on righteousness as a breastplate and indifferent judgment instead of a helmet. <sup>19</sup>He shall take holiness for an invincible shield. <sup>20</sup>His severe wrath shall he sharpen for a sword, and the creation shall fight with him against the unwise. <sup>21</sup>Then shall the right aiming thunderbolts go abroad; and from the clouds, as from a well-drawn bow, and

they shall fly to the mark. <sup>22</sup>And hailstones full of wrath shall be cast out as a stone bow, and the water of the sea shall rage against them, and the floods shall cruelly drown them. <sup>23</sup>Yea, a mighty wind shall stand up against them, and like a storm shall blow them away; thus iniquity shall lay waste the whole earth, and ill dealing shall overthrow the thrones of the mighty. <sup>6:1</sup>Hear therefore, O ye kings, and under-stand; learn, ye that be judges of the ends of the earth. <sup>2</sup>Give ear, ye that rule the people, and glory in the multitude of nations. <sup>3</sup>For power is given to you of the Lord, and sovereignty from the Highest, who shall try your works, and search out your counsels.

## The Reading from the Wisdom of Solomon (3:1-9):

<sup>3:1</sup>The souls of the righteous are in the hand of God, and there shall no torment touch them. <sup>2</sup>In the sight of the unwise they seemed to die: and their departure is taken for misery, <sup>3</sup>and their going from us to be utter destruction: but they are in peace. <sup>4</sup>For though they be punished in the

sight of men, yet is their hope full of immortality. <sup>5</sup>And having been a little chastised, they shall be greatly rewarded: for God proved them, and found them worthy for Himself. <sup>6</sup>As gold in the furnace hath He tried them and received them as a burnt offering. <sup>7</sup>And in the time of their visitation they shall

shine, and run to and fro like sparks among the stubble. <sup>8</sup>They shall judge the nations, and have dominion over the people, and their Lord shall reign forever. <sup>9</sup>They that put their trust in

Him shall understand the truth: and such as be faithful in love shall abide with Him: for grace and mercy is to His saints, and He hath care for His elect.

### The Reading from the Wisdom of Solomon (4:7-15):

4:7 The righteous man, though he die early yet shall he be at rest. <sup>8</sup>For old age is not honored for length of time, nor is it measured by number of years; <sup>9</sup>but wisdom is gray hair for men, and a blameless life is ripe old age. <sup>10</sup>There was one who pleased God and was so beloved of Him, that while living among sinners he was taken up. <sup>11</sup>He was caught up lest evil change his understanding or guile deceive his soul. <sup>12</sup>For the fascination of wickedness

obscures that which is good, and roving desire perverts the innocent mind. <sup>13</sup>Being so perfected in a short time, he fulfilled long years; <sup>14</sup>for his soul was pleasing to the Lord, therefore He took him quickly from the midst of wickedness. <sup>15</sup>Yet this the peoples saw and did not understand, neither did they take such a thing to heart, that God's grace and mercy are upon His holy ones, and He hath care for His elect.

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And blessèd art thou in thy <u>la</u>bors for Christ! /
For thou didst confound the power of the <u>enemy</u>, /
O companion of the righteous and con<u>verser</u> with the <u>angels!</u> ///
Together with them, pray to the Lord that He will have mercy on our souls!
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### Now and ever..., of the Feast, in the same Tone:

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## The Troparion of the Saint, in Tone 8:

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Thine abundant tears made the wilderness <u>sprout</u> and bloom / And thy suffering made thy labors fruitful a <u>hundredfold</u> / Thou hast become a shining torch over all the world /// O our holy father Theodosius, pray to Christ God that He may <u>save</u> our souls.
