Beholding Thee, O Jesus, <u>nailed</u> to the Cross / And accepting suffering of Thine <u>own</u> will, / The Virgin, Thy Mother, O <u>Master, cried</u> aloud: / "Woe is me, O my <u>sweet</u> Child! / How is it that Thou dost endure unjust <u>wounding</u>, / O Physician who healeth the in<u>fi</u>rmities of <u>mankind</u> /// And by Thy loving-kindness dost deliver all from corruption?"
