that he will receive anything from the Lord; ⁸he is a double-minded man, unstable in all his ways. ⁹Let the lowly brother glory in his exaltation, ¹⁰but the rich in his humiliation, because as a flower of the field he will pass away. ¹¹For no sooner is the sun risen with a burning heat than it withers the grass; its flower falls, and its beautiful appearance perishes. Deliver us from dangers, O pure Theotokos, who gavest birth to Eternal Redemption, and to the Peace that passes all understanding.

Dispel the darkness of my sins by the radiance of thy splendor, O Bride of God, for thou didst bear the divine and pre-eternal Light.

Heal the infirmity of my soul, O pure Lady, when thou hast deemed me worthy of thy visitation, and grant me health by thy blessed intercessions.

The Canon of the Saint

Irmos: Rising early we cry to Thee, O Lord: Save us, for Thou art our God, and we know none other than Thee.

Thy words, O Evangelist, are like the dew of heaven that extinguished the burning heat of deception and idolatry.

Bearing the knowledge of the awesome Judgment of God in thy heart, thou didst

teach mankind the true meaning of salvation.

Ascending to the summit of the mountain of the virtues, O blessèd Luke, thou didst preach the Good News of the kingdom of God to all.

Theotokion: **O** Mary Theotokos, who knew no wedlock, render all the devices of the enemy to be in vain, and gladden the souls of those who praise thee.

Ode 6

The Supplicatory Canon to the Theotokos

Irmos: I will pour out my prayer before the Lord; I will make known to Him my sorrow, for my soul has been filled with afflictions, and my life has drawn near to hell, and like Jonah I will pray: O God, raise me up from corruption.

My nature, held by corruption and death, hath He saved out of death and corruption; for unto death hath He submitted Himself. Wherefore, O Virgin, do thou intercede with Him Who is thy Lord and Son, to deliver me from the wickedness of the enemy.

I know thee as the protection of my life, and most safe fortress, O Virgin; disperse the horde of temptations, and drive away demonic vexation. Unceasingly I pray to thee: Deliver me from the corruption of passions!

We have acquired thee as a wall of refuge, and the perfect salvation of our souls, and a relief in afflictions, O Maiden, and we ever rejoice in thy light. O Sovereign Lady, do thou also now save us from passions and dangers.

Bedridden, I lie supine with sickness now and there is no healing for my flesh; but to thee, O good one who gavest birth to God, the Savior of the world and the Healer of infirmities, I pray: Raise me up from the corruption of illness.

The Canon of the Saint

Irmos: Grant me a robe of light, O Thou who clothes Thyself with light as with a garment, O greatly merciful Christ our God.

Having tasted of the cup of wisdom, thou gavest all to drink of the knowledge of Christ God, O wise Evangelist Luke.

Chosen to be the apostolic companion of Paul, O most blessèd and divinely-eloquent Luke, thou didst fish amongst the nations with the net of dogma and truth.

Thou wast like a cloud raining down upon us with the shower of life, O apostle, making the spring of salvation to flow for us all.

Theotokion: We worship Thy Son, who destroyed the worship of idolatry, together

with the Father and the Spirit, O Virgin Mary Theotokos.

Katavasia: "Let us clap our hands in gladness..."

The Kontakion of St. Luke, in Tone 2: To the melody, "The steadfast..."

Let us praise the divine Apostle Luke / As a preacher of true piety, / A teacher of the ineffable mysteries / And a blazing star of the Church. / For the Word who alone knoweth the secret hearts of men /// Chose him with the wise Paul, to be a teacher of the Gentiles.

Ikos: Enriched with heavenly knowledge by the hand of the Master thou wast entrusted with the portion of the Gentiles, O most-laudable one. And with thy life being set afire by the Word, thou didst become a greater transmitter of the Law than Moses, O Apostle and Evangelist Luke! Through the Spirit thou didst explain the divine Faith, being like a tablet inscribed by the finger of God. Therefore, Christ who alone knoweth the hearts of men, hath so glorified thee!

Ode 7

The Supplicatory Canon to the Theotokos

The children of Judæa who dwelt of old in Babylon trampled underfoot the Irmos: flames of the furnace by their faith in the Trinity, as they sang: Blessèd art Thou, O God of our fathers.

Having willed to accomplish our salvation, O Savior, Thou didst dwell in the womb of the Virgin, and didst show her forth unto the world as its intercessor. Blessèd art Thou, O God of our fathers.

In Babylon of old, the pious youths did not worship the image made of gold, but standing, covered with dew in the midst of the fiery furnace they sang: Blessèd and exalted above all art

Thou, O God of our fathers!

Being a faithful disciple of the ineffable mysteries of Christ God, O most wise one, thou didst preach His divine Gospel to the faithful, and they sang: Blessèd and exalted above all art Thou, O God of our fathers!

Thou wast adorned with the beauty of the virtues, O most blessèd Apostle and Evangelist Luke, and thou wast illumined by the radiance of divine majesty, as thou didst cry: Blessèd and exalted above all art Thou, O God of our fathers!

Thou wast like a beacon in the middle of the night blazing with radiant light, driving away the darkness of pagan deception with the radiance of thy pious words, as thou didst cry aloud: Blessèd and exalted above all art Thou, O God of our fathers!

Theotokion: **O** Luke, eye-witness of the Lord and His Crucifixion, thou didst live a life inspired by the very words of God; thou didst relate the Good News to all of the birthgiving of the Virgin, and didst lovingly portray her in her holy icons, which we faithfully venerate as we glorify Christ.

Ode 8

The Supplicatory Canon to the Theotokos

Irmos: The King of heaven whom the hosts of angels praise, let us praise and exalt throughout all ages.

Disdain not those who need thy help, O Virgin, and who hymn and supremely exalt thee unto all ages.

Thou healest the infirmity of my soul and the pains of my body, O Virgin, that I may glorify thee, O pure one, unto all ages.

Thou pourest forth a wealth of healing, on those who with faith sing praises unto thee, O Virgin, and who supremely exalt thine ineffable Childbearing.

Thou drivest away the assaults of temptations, and the attacks of the passions, O Virgin; Therefore, we sing thee hymns unto all ages.

Ode 9 The Supplicatory Canon to the Theotokos

Irmos: Saved through thee, O pure Virgin, we confess thee to be truly Theotokos, and with the choirs of angels we magnify thee.

O Virgin, who didst give birth to Christ, Who doth wipe away every tear from every face: turn not away from the torrent of my tears.

O Virgin, who didst receive the fullness of joy, and didst banish the grief of sin: fill my heart with joy.

Be thou the haven and protection, the unshakable wall, the refuge, the shelter, and the joy of those who flee to thee, O Virgin.

Illumine with the rays of thy light, O Virgin, those who piously confess thee to be the Theotokos, and banish from them the darkness of ignorance.

I am brought low by mine afflictions and infirmities, but do thou, O Virgin, heal me, bringing me from illness into health.

Irmos: With magnify thee, O Theotokos who knew no wedlock, with unceasing praise, for in a manner past all understanding, God made His abode in thine all-pure womb at the word of the Archangel, O thou who art more glorious than the heavenly hosts.

In preaching the Gospel thou didst proclaim to all the salvation of the world, and

breathing in the very inspiration of the Spirit, thou wast revealed as a great and holy instrument of God, O most honored and divinely-eloquent Apostle and Evangelist Luke

Witnessing the acts of the Savior's apostles, thou wast moved by God to record them faithfully, thus setting them forth as a lasting and inspiring model, O most glorious preacher and Evangelist Luke.

Thou didst ascend to the heights and didst thus attain thine ultimate desire, for thou standest now before Christ delighting in the divine vision bestowed by Him. Therefore, we all call thee blessed, O divinely-inspired Evangelist Luke.

Theotokion: We magnify thee, O Mother of God, for thou didst bear in thine arms the unapproachable God of all, who is hymned and praised in heaven by all the angelic hosts, and who ever grants salvation to all mankind through thee, O Lady Theotokos.

Katavasia: "Let every earth-born exult..."

The Exapostilarion of the Saint:

Enlightening those on earth with the bright rays of the knowledge of God.

<u>Mastering the art of healing souls</u> / More assuredly than the art of healing <u>bo</u>dies / Thou didst ex<u>cel</u> at both for thou wast filled with the <u>wisdom of God</u> / And by healing both the <u>soul</u> and the <u>bo</u>dy / <u>Mankind was called to the knowledge of God</u>. / Being lifted, as on wings, to His love, they rise daily to <u>heaven</u> /// Through thine intercessions for all those who praise thee.

Those <u>drowning</u> in the sea of <u>ignorance</u> / Were pulled from the depths to the <u>knowl</u>edge of God / By the <u>net</u> of thy words, O all <u>blessed</u> one, / And were <u>offered</u> by <u>thee</u> to Christ. / Being <u>a</u>lso an apostle of the <u>Sa</u>vior / Thou wast a wise herald and narrator of His <u>acts</u> of grace / And thou didst re<u>ceive</u> in return eternal life as an honor <u>well</u>-deserved /// O most holy Apostle Luke.

In Tone 8: *(by Leo the Magistrate)*

<u>Come</u>, all creation, and let us <u>praise</u> in song / The true healer of the <u>spi</u>rit, / The disciple of the <u>Savior</u>, / The ever-memorable a<u>po</u>stle Luke, / For he heals the sickness of un<u>go</u>dliness / By anointing in the <u>baptistry</u> of Christ; / And with the divine water of the Holy Gospel <u>flo</u>wing from his lips / He satisfies and enlivens <u>all</u> the earth. His proclamation has gone out into the <u>ends</u> of the <u>universe</u> /// And he ever prays for the salvation of our souls.

Glory..., in the same Tone:

<u>Come</u>, all ye faithful as<u>se</u>mbled / And like David let us praise the mystical <u>he</u>rald of the Word, / The <u>holy Apostle Luke</u>. Thy tongue is like the <u>swift</u> pen of Christ / Enlightening the eyes of the pagans leading them to the <u>kno</u>wledge of God. / Proclaiming the Good News of Christ and the Acts of the <u>Holy Apostles</u>, thy friends. / Standing now before the Holy <u>Trinity</u> /// Pray thou for the salvation of our souls.

Now and ever..., Theotokion, in the same Tone:

Accept, O Sovereign Lady / The prayers of us, thy <u>se</u>rvants, /// And deliver us from every danger and ne<u>ce</u>ssity.

Great Doxology, Troparion, usual Litanies, and the Dismissal.

The Prokeimenon, in Tone 8: Their proclamation is gone out into all the earth / and their words to the ends of the universe! *Verse:* The heavens are telling the glory of God, and the firmament proclaims His handiwork!

The Epistle: (260-ctr) 2 Col. 4:5-9,14,18

The Alleluia, Tone 1: The heavens shall confess Thy wonders, O Lord, and Thy truth in the congregation of the saints! *Verse:* God is glorified in the council of the saints!

The Gospel: (51) Luke 10:16-21

The Communion Hymn: Their proclamation is gone out into all the earth / and their words to the ends of the universe!

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
