The 14th Day of December Martyrs Thýrsus, Leucius, Callínicus of Appolonia; Martyrs Apollonius, Philēmon, Arianus, and Theotychus of Alexandria.

Vespers

At "Lord, I call...," 3 stichera, in Tone 4: To the melody, "Thou hast given a sign...."

The wondrous <u>Thy</u>rsus, / Divinely-wise Callínicus and <u>Leu</u>cius, / Con<u>fe</u>ssed the uncreated <u>Tri</u>nity / While enduring most-cruel afflictions and torments with true <u>cou</u>rage. / Being true champions, they received their crowns of <u>vi</u>ctory, /// And became co-citizens with the angels in <u>paradise</u>.

The great Philēmon, richly bless't Arianus and wise Apol<u>lo</u>nius / Extinguished the flames of paganism with the <u>streams</u> of their blood / And <u>wa</u>tered the earth with the divine streams of the <u>kno</u>wledge of God. / And being our fervent de<u>fenders</u>, / They dried up the rivers of passions by divine grace /// With the torrent of their <u>hea</u>lings.

The glorious martyrs <u>blo</u>ssomed / Like the beautiful flowers of a <u>ga</u>rden, / Giving <u>out</u> the divine fragrance of the <u>Spi</u>rit / Faithfully perfuming the thoughts of those honoring the me<u>mo</u>rial / Of their sufferings, struggles and di<u>vine</u> repose. / Now they abide, ever rejoicing, /// In the glow of the never-waning Light.

> *Note:* But if we sing "Alleluia" at Matins instead of "God is the Lord," then the following 3 stichera to the Theotokos are sung at Vespers, at "Lord, I call," before the above stichera of the Saint, in the same Tone and melody:

Rain down upon me, O <u>La</u>dy, / The flowing waters of thy <u>me</u>rcy, / And as <u>thou</u> art <u>me</u>rciful, / Give drink to my heart being consumed by the heat of my <u>pa</u>ssions; / And cause drops of compunction to fall upon me, O <u>Mai</u>den, / That I may find consolation, I <u>pray</u> thee, /// Together with those, who sincerely <u>shed</u> their tears.

Take pity on me, O <u>La</u>dy, /

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For I am shaken by the assaults of <u>demons</u> / A<u>bout</u> to be cast down into the pit of des<u>tru</u>ction; / But strengthen thou me on the rock of <u>vi</u>rtues / And destroy thou the counsels of mine <u>enemies</u>, / And vouchsafe that I may follow the precepts of thy <u>Son</u> and God / That I may receive the re<u>mi</u>ssion of my sins /// On the Day of <u>Ju</u>dgment.

I have fallen in among thieves and <u>mu</u>rderers / And have been stripped of my immaculate, heavenly <u>ga</u>rments / And by their <u>pi</u>tiless assaults, I have been grievously <u>wou</u>nded / And lie, barely alive, in a place of af<u>fli</u>ction: / Yet, I pray, come thou be<u>fore</u> me, /// Extend thy hand to me and raise me up, O <u>La</u>dy.

Glory..., now and ever..., Theotokion, in the same Tone: (and melody)

I lie on the bed of des<u>po</u>ndency, / And waste my life away in <u>la</u>ziness, / I am <u>te</u>rrified at the coming <u>time</u> of my end, / And of serpent, who like a lurking lion who will devour my <u>fee</u>ble soul; / Yet, I pray, come thou to me be<u>fore</u> my end, /// And in thy graciousness raise me up, O <u>La</u>dy.

Or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone: *To the melody, "As one valiant among the martyrs...."*

Beholding Christ, who loveth mankind, <u>cru</u>cified, / His side <u>pierced</u> by a spear, / The all-<u>pure</u> one, cried aloud, la<u>menting</u>: / "What is this, <u>O</u> my Son? / How have these thankless people re<u>wa</u>rded Thee / For all the good things Thou hast <u>done</u> for them? / Dost Thou hasten to leave me childless, O most be<u>loved Son? ///</u> I marvel, O Compassionate One, at Thy voluntary crucifixion!"

The Aposticha is from the Octoechos.

The General Troparion of the Martyrs, in Tone 1: (None given in the Menaion)

We be<u>seech</u> Thee, O Lord and <u>Lover of man</u>, / By the sufferings Thy saints en<u>dured</u> for Thee, /

MARTYRS THYRSUS, LEUCIUS, CALLINICUS AND OTHERS.

To <u>heal</u> all our af<u>fli</u>ctions, /// And deliver us from our trans<u>gre</u>ssions.
