Vespers

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At "Lord, I call...," 3 stichera, in Tone 4: To the melody, "Thou hast given a sign...."
Desiring a blessedness past all understanding /
Thou didst count abstinence as nourishment, O wondrous one, /
Poverty as riches, abundance in meagerness, /
And humility as glory. /
Therefore thou didst attain thy greatest desire /
Given thee in accordance to thy reasoning, ///
Abiding now in the mansions of the saints, O father Basil.
By fulfilling the course of thy life in tireless abstinence /
And for keeping the Faith /
Thou wast adorned with the crown of righteousness, O father, /
Which Christ had prepared for thee /
As a reward for thine accomplishments /
And in honor of thy sufferings. /
So, beseech Him now, O divinely-inspired Basil, ///
That He may save our souls.
By enslaving the passions of thy body, O wise one, /
Thou didst cast aside the love of pleasure; /
And by mortifying thy senses by the pain of abstinence, /
Perseverance and longsuffering. /
Thou didst attain the eternal delights, ///
The sweetness of heaven and inexpressible joy.
Glory..., now and ever..., Theotokion in the same Tone: (and melody)
Be merciful and gracious to me, O Lady, /
And strengthen me on the rock of virtues /
For by the craftiness of demons I have fallen into the pit of perdition. /
O help me to defeat the assaults of the enemy, /
And vouchsafe that I may fulfill the commands of thy Son and our God ///
That I may receive the remission of sins on Judgment Day.

Or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone: (and melody)

Beholding Christ, who loveth mankind, <u>cru</u>cified, /
His side <u>pierced</u> by a spear, /
The all-<u>pure</u> one, cried aloud, la<u>menting</u>: /
"What is this, <u>O</u> my Son? /
How have these thankless people re<u>warded</u> Thee /
For all the good things Thou hast <u>done</u> for them? /
Dost Thou hasten to leave me childless, O most be<u>loved</u> Son? ///
I marvel, O Compassionate One, at Thy voluntary crucifixion!"

The Troparion of the Saint, in Tone 1:

O dweller in the wilderness and angel in the body, /
Thou wast a wonderworker, O our God-bearing father Basil. /
Thou didst receive heavenly gifts
Through fasting, vigil, and prayer: /
Healing the sick and the souls of those drawn to thee by faith /
Glory to Him who gave thee strength! /
Glory to Him who hath granted thee a crown! ///
Glory to Him who through thee grants healing to all!
