# The 7<sup>th</sup> Day of October Commemoration of the Holy Martyrs Sergius and Bacchus.

### **Vespers**

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At "Lord I call...," 6 stichera, in Tone 6: To the melody, "Having set all aside...."
Renouncing all earthy power /
And coming to disregard the flesh /
You came to love God alone, /
And wearing the robes of dishonor put on you in mockery /
You received indestructible garments of light from heaven. /
Now you rejoice in paradise wearing your crowns, O richly blessed ones, /
And we entreat you to cover us from above with a veil of protection /
For we have been stripped naked by the deceptions of the enemy. (twice)
O all-praised Bacchus and all-glorious Sergius, /
You are vessels of the Holy Spirit /
That pour torrents of healing upon all;
O steadfast protectors and mighty champions of the Church, /
Voluntary sacrifices and honored offerings, /
You illumine the ends of the earth with the light of piety. /
We entreat you to drive away the gloominess of evil ///
And dispel the darkness which surrounds our souls.
Having fled your corruptible bodies, O glorious martyrs, /
You received in return spiritual joy and eternal light, /
Everlasting life, and the mansions of heaven that do not pass away.
Yet pray for us that we also may receive these things /
Though we have been slain by our passions /
And have not turned away from our sins. /
O holy Sergius and Bacchus, the heavenly intercessors for the faithful, ///
Pray with boldness on behalf of our souls.
Glory..., in Tone 4:
Radiant is the two-fold splendor of the martyrs /
Bacchus and Sergius, /
For they cast down the savagery of the tormentors /
And abolished the falsehood of idolatry /
And, preaching with clear voices they proclaimed the perfect mystery of divine
      knowledge. /
Through their prayers, O Christ, Thou giver of the Law, /
And perfect Judge of the contest and the bestower of crowns, /

#### 7 OCTOBER

Vouchsafe that we too may receive our crowns /// In the battle against the invisible powers of evil.

Now and ever..., Theotokion, in Tone 4,

**Or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone:** *To the melody, "As one valiant among the martyrs...."* 

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Beholding Christ, who loveth mankind, <u>cru</u>cified, /
His side <u>pierced</u> by a spear, /
The all-<u>pure</u> one, cried aloud, la<u>menting</u>: /
"What is this, <u>O</u> my Son? /
How have these thankless people re<u>warded</u> Thee /
For all the good things Thou hast <u>done</u> for them? /
Dost Thou hasten to leave me childless, O most be<u>lo</u>vèd Son? ///
I marvel, O Compassionate One, at Thy voluntary crucifixion!"
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Or Dogmatic Theotokion in the Tone of the Week if a Resurrection service.

### The Aposticha from the Octoechos, then:

## Glory..., in Tone 8:

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The <u>ranks</u> of Christ's army of martyrs have been strengthened against the <u>enemy</u>, / For among them now stand two glorious <u>warriors</u> / The excellent <u>Sergius</u> and <u>Bacchus</u>, / Who both shine like the most <u>radiant</u> stars. / For by them the evil host of demons was <u>turned</u> to flight; / By them the tyrants were amazed and the angels were a<u>stonished</u> / Beholding as the bodiless foe was trampled by <u>mortal</u> men. / And the Church of the faithful now celebrates their <u>joy</u>ful feast / And it cries <u>out</u> with uni<u>versal</u> joy: / O Thou, who through the weakness of the flesh bound the power of the <u>enemy</u>, /// O Lord, save our souls through the <u>prayers</u> of Thy saints.
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# Now and ever..., Theotokion, in Tone 8,

Or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone: To the melody, "O most glorious wonder...."

"What is this sight that I see, /
What do mine eyes behold, O Master? /
Thou, who sustainest all creation, lifted up on the Tree, /

Dost die granting <u>life</u> to all," /

Cried the Theotokos, weeping, when she beheld upon the Cross ///

#### MARTYRS SERGIUS AND BACCHUS

The God-man Who had ineffably shone <u>forth</u> from her.

### The Troparion of the Martyrs, in Tone 4:

Thy holy martyrs, Sergius and <u>Bác</u>chus, O Lord / Through their sufferings received their incorruptible crowns from <u>Theé</u>, our God. / For having Thy strength they laid low their <u>én</u>emies / And shattered the powerless boldness of <u>dé</u>mons. /// Through their intercessions, O Christ God, <u>sáve</u> our souls.

## Or this Troparion, in Tone 5:

O <u>Sergius</u> the much-suffering and Bacchus the <u>glorious</u>, / You are the adornment of the <u>martyrs</u> of Christ, / And you are the <u>eyes</u> of His <u>ho</u>ly Church, / For you enlighten the <u>eyes</u> of our souls. / Entreat ye the Lord, that we may escape the <u>darkness</u> of sin / And may be behold the ever<u>lasting</u> light, /// Through your holy <u>prayers</u>, O glorious <u>martyrs</u>.

#### **Matins**

The Canon of the martyrs with 6 Troparia, in Tone 1, having the acrostic: "I praise Sergius the martyr and the ever-memorable Bacchus," the composition of Theophanes — incomplete as of 4/2018

### After the Sixth Ode, the Kontakion, in Tone 2:

Courageously arming your mind against the enemy / You destroyed all his lies, O all-laudable martyrs. / And you received the trophy of victory from on high / And cried out with loud voices in unity of mind: /// Behold how good and joyous it is to be with God!
