### Translation of the Relics of the Holy Hieromartyr Ignatius, Bishop of Antioch, the God-bearer.

#### Vespers

At "Lord, I call...," 6 stichera, Tone 4: To the melody, "As one valiant among the martyrs...."

As a successor of the theo<u>logians</u> / And following in their <u>foo</u>tsteps, / <u>Ri</u>sing in the East, thou didst ap<u>pear</u> in the West / Illumining all with the lightning flashes of divine <u>preaching</u>; / And having set like the sun from the world thou didst rise like the <u>dawn</u> before God /// Crowned with the radiance of grace, O father Ig<u>na</u>tius. (twice)

Thy relics, sanctified by thy <u>struggles</u>, / O all-wise and God-bearing father I<u>gna</u>tius, / Were <u>reverently</u> returned to thy <u>city</u>, / And shining with grace they fill everything with a sweet-smelling <u>frag</u>rance /// And those who celebrate thy memory are inspired with divine joy and <u>glad</u>ness.

(twice)

O God-bearing father Ignatius, / Thou didst shine <u>forth</u> unto the world / <u>Brighter</u> than the morning star <u>from</u> the <u>East</u> / Now, with the return of thy divine <u>relics</u> / Thou sendest forth thy brilliant rays from the West up<u>on</u> the earth, / Ever entreating Christ to deliver from corruption and mis<u>fortune</u> /// Those who with faith celebrate thine all-precious <u>memory</u>. *(twice)* 

#### Glory..., in Tone 8: (The composition of Anatolius)

O <u>God</u>-bearing father Ignatius, / Having embraced thy be<u>loved Christ, /</u> Thou didst receive thy reward for being a <u>priest</u> of His <u>Go</u>spel. And thou didst finish thy life by the <u>she</u>dding of thy blood, Truly becoming wheat for the immortal <u>Maker of all /</u> By being ground by the <u>teeth</u> of <u>wild</u> beasts / Thus becoming an offering of the sweetest of <u>bread</u> for Him. /// Pray for us, O blessèd <u>martyr</u>.

#### 29 JANUARY

# **Now and ever..., Theotokion, or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone:** *To the melody, "O most glorious wonder...."*

"What is this <u>sight</u> that I see, / What do mine eyes behold, O <u>Master?</u> / Thou, Who sustainest all creation, lifted <u>up on</u> the Tree, / Dost die granting <u>life</u> to all," / Cried the Theotokos, weeping, when she be<u>held</u> up<u>on</u> the Cross /// The God-man Who had ineffably shone <u>forth</u> from her.

#### The Aposticha is from the Octoechos, then:

#### Glory..., of the Saint, in Tone 1: (The composition of Byzantius)

O thy <u>firm</u> and adamant mind, O rightly-bless't Ig<u>natius!</u> / Being filled with earnest love for Him who loved thee, <u>thou</u> didst say: / There is no <u>fire</u> of yearning in me for material things, / Rather, the living water speaks <u>deeply</u> with<u>in</u> me, / Saying: <u>Come</u> to the <u>Fa</u>ther. / Therefore being enflamed by the Holy <u>Spirit</u> / Thou didst per<u>mit</u> the wild beasts to separate thee <u>quickly</u> from this world / And <u>send</u> thee to thy be<u>loved</u> Christ. /// Beseech Him now to <u>save</u> our souls!

# **Now and ever..., Theotokion, or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone:** *To the melody, "O all-praised martyrs...."*

Standing before the Cross of thy Son and God, / And beholding His long-suffering, O pure Mother, thou didst cry out weeping: / Woe is me, O my Child most sweet! / What are these things which Thou dost suffer unjustly, /// O Word of God, that Thou mightest save mankind?'

#### The Troparion of the Hieromartyr, in Tone 4:

Like the apostles in <u>cha</u>racter, / A successor on their throne, O divinely-in<u>spi</u>red one / Through visions thou didst <u>find</u> thy work / Rightly dividing the <u>word</u> of truth. / Thou didst suffer for the <u>sake</u> of the faith /
