Vespers

At "Lord, I call...," 6 stichera of the Saints, in Tone 1: To the melody, "Joy of the ranks of heaven.... **B**rightly you illumined the whole universe / With the rays of your miracles, O Cyrus and John. / For you were set, like radiant stars, in the heavens and made worthy of grace /// By your virtuous lives on earth. (twice) O glorious martyrs of the Lord, / Like rain-bearing clouds you mystically shower the entire world / With your abundant and richly-flowing miracles and blessings /// Moving all to offer songs the praise to God Truly, you received the skill from God / To heal the passions of both soul and body; / You heal by means of supernatural miracles / And not through any human medicine, /// O ye glorious martyrs of the Lord. O glorious martyrs, Cyril and John, / Being now in the company of the angels in heaven, / You heal the spiritual maladies and bodily ailments of those still on earth / For the sake of Christ our God. /// Entreat Him now, to save our souls. Like the rivers of grace which flow at the coming of Christ / You are revealed to all as fountains of immortality, / Pouring forth the sweet streams of healing / Upon all physical and spiritual maladies /// For you zealously shed the streams of your blood for Christ. Glory..., in Tone 8:

Today wonder-working martyrs, Cyril and John, / Rise above us like luminous stars / Healing the maladies of our souls. / For like angels, they both fought the good fight to the end / And spilled their martyrs' blood for Christ, /

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And both, like soldiers have enlisted as citizens in the <u>army of heaven</u>. / From where they grant healing to all who faithfully honor their <u>me</u>mory /// As they pray for the salvation of our souls.

Now and ever..., Theotokion in the same Tone,

Or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone: To the melody "O most glorious wonder..."

"I cannot bear to look upon Thee, O my Child, / Asleep in death upon the Tree, / Who grantest life to all mankind, / Imparting divine and saving life to those / Who in ancient times fell into the sleep of perdition / Through the fruit of transgression." / Cried the weeping Virgin, whom we magnify.

Or, if a Friday or Saturday evening, the Dogmatic Theotokion in the Tone of the Week.

Glory..., in Tone 2:

O come, ye assembly of the <u>fai</u>thful, /
And let us crown Cyrus and John with our <u>songs</u> of praise, /
For they <u>grew</u> in grace, and now distribute it <u>ge</u>nerously /
And are revealed to all as the most-excellent phy<u>si</u>cians ///
Who ceaselessly <u>pray</u> for our souls.

Now and ever..., Theotokion in the same Tone,

Or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone: To the melody "Down from the Tree...."

Beholding the ripened <u>Clu</u>ster of grapes, /
Which thou didst chastely <u>bear</u> in thy womb,
Hanging on the Tree, O <u>pure</u> one, /
Thou didst cry out <u>lamenting</u>: /
"O my Child, let the drops of Thy <u>sweetness</u>
Fall like <u>new</u> wine /
And abolish the drunkenness of every <u>passion</u>.
This I entreat of Thine own loving-<u>kindness</u>, ///
For my sake, who bore Thee, O Benefactor of all!"
