"Woe is me, my be<u>loved Child</u> /
What hath the ungrateful <u>people done</u> to Thee? ///
Wishing to leave me childless, O my beloved One."
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Or, on a Friday or Saturday Evening, the Dogmatic Theotokion in the Tone of the Week.

The General Troparion of Venerable Monastics, in Tone 4: (No Troparion given in the Menaion)

The image of God was truly preserved in thee, O <u>Fa</u>ther, /
For thou didst take up thy cross and <u>fo</u>llow Christ /
By so doing thou didst teach us to disregard the flesh, for it <u>pa</u>sses away /
But to care instead for the soul, since it is im<u>mo</u>rtal ///
Therefore thy spirit, O father Titus, rejoices with the <u>angels</u>.
