3 stichera of the Hieromartyr, in Tone 1: To the melody, "O all-praised martyrs...."
O divinely wise and blessed one, /
Thou didst brighten thy sacred and godly vesture with the crimson of thy blood, /
Piously didst thou grow from strength to strength /
And from glory to glory. ///
Pray now that our souls be granted peace and great mercy.
As a true priest thou didst offer the bloodless sacrifice to God /
And as a true martyr thou didst offer thine own blood to Christ /
As a fruitful and well pleasing sacrifice. /
O most hon'rable and eloquent one, ///
Entreat thou Him for us who sing thy praises.
Thou didst lead an army of martyrs to Christ, /
Through thine instructions and thy teachings /
Presenting thyself as a model for them to emulate, /
O blessèd father Anthimus. ///
Together with them now, pray that our souls be granted peace and great mercy.
And 3 stichera of the Venerable Father, in Tone 8: To the melody, "Thy martyrs...."
O holy father Theoctistus, /
The radiance of thy memory /
And the beauty of thy life; /
The riches of thy wonders and the splendor of thy gifts /
Gladden all the assemblies of monastics. ///
Entreat Christ that our souls be granted peace and great mercy.
O holy father Theoctistus, /
The demon are overcome by thine ascetic patience /
And they cower at thine unceasing prayer. /
For hast thou acquired Christ as thy companion, O all-laudable one. ///
Entreat Him now that our souls be granted peace and great mercy.

Thou didst remain true as a priest to the end, /

Thou didst shed thy blood for Christ God. /
Thus, thou didst offer thyself an acceptable sacrifice to Him. /
Therefore having boldness before Him /
Earnestly pray for those who with faith keep thine all-honored memory ///
That they may be delivered from every temptation, misfortune and danger.
Now and ever..., Theotokion, in Tone 6, or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same
Tone: To the melody "On the third day...."
Standing with Thy pure disciple before the Tree /
At Thy crucifixion, /
The all-pure Virgin cried aloud: /
'Woe is me, Why dost Thou suffer, O Christ, ///
Who art the dispassion of all?'
Or Dogmatic Theotokion in the Tone of the Week if a Resurrection service.

Thine instructions have gone out into all the earth; /
Destroying the legions of demons; /
By this thou hast found the reward of thy labors in heaven; /

Whose life thou didst blamelessly emulate. /
And having great boldness before Christ God ///
Entreat Him that peace be granted to our souls.

## The Troparion of the Hieromartyr, in Tone 4:

Like the apostles in <a href="mailto:character">character</a>, /
A successor on their throne, O divinely-inspired one /
Through visions thou didst <a href="mailto:find">find</a> thy work /
Rightly dividing the <a href="word">word</a> of truth. /
Thou didst suffer for the <a href="sake">sake</a> of the faith /
Even to the <a href="mailto:shedding">shedding</a> of thy blood ///
O hieromartyr Anthimus, pray Christ God that our souls may be saved.

#### Glory..., the Troparion of the Venerable Father Theoctistus, in Tone 8:

Thine abundant tears made the wilderness <u>sprout</u> and bloom /
And thy suffering made thy labors fruitful a <u>hundredfold</u> /
Thou hast become a shining torch over <u>all</u> the world /
O our holy father Theoctistus, pray to Christ God that He may <u>save</u> our souls.
