The 21st Day of April

Commemoration of the Holy Hieromartyr Januarius, Bishop of Beneventum and his Companions; and the Commemoration of the Holy Hieromartyr Theodore, Bishop of Perge.

Vespers

At "Lord, I call...," 6 stichera:

3 stichera to St. Januarius, in Tone 4: To the melody, "As one valiant among the martyrs...."

As a holy hierarch, O Ja<u>nu</u>arius, / And a holy martyr condemned <u>u</u>nder the law. / By thine own <u>blood</u> and not by that of a<u>no</u>ther / Didst thou enter into <u>hea</u>ven / To stand before Jesus, the Cre<u>a</u>tor of all; / And gazing upon Him now, O holy father, /// Thou dost behold Him together with the angels.

Cut by the sword, cast into the fire, and thrown to <u>wild</u> beasts, / Thrown into prison for many long <u>days</u> at a time, / Thou didst re<u>main</u> unwavering in mind by the strength of divine <u>power</u> / O rightly <u>wondrous</u> one, / And being condemned by the law, thou didst com<u>plete</u> thy course /// O holy hierarch and converser with the <u>angels</u>.

Together let us <u>hon</u>or / The deacon Proclus and the reader Desi<u>dé</u>rius, / <u>Só</u>cius the deacon with Faustus and Eutychius, / With the glorious Januarius and wise A<u>cu</u>tius, / For they are holy ministers and the crowned <u>witnesses</u> of Christ, / All, citizens of the heavenly Je<u>ru</u>salem, /// And the intercessors for those who truly bless their holy <u>me</u>mory.

And 3 stichera to Saint Theodore, in the same Tone: *To the melody, "Thou hast given a sign...."*

Note: If at Presanctified, these stichera are sung at the Praises of Matins.

Standing before the unrighteous tri<u>bu</u>nal, / O holy greatmartyr <u>The</u>odore, / Thou didst de<u>nounce</u> the pagan <u>i</u>dols, / And for this thou wast unjustly <u>bea</u>ten / And wast stretched out upon a <u>sea</u>ring grill; /

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Then thou wast covered with the dew of the <u>Spi</u>rit / Who imparted steadfast <u>strength</u> to thee /// That thou mayest destroy the savagery of the cruel enemy.

Truly thou didst become a <u>cha</u>riot of our God / Bearing to Him thy <u>most</u> pure heart, / Being <u>bound</u> by chains, thou didst loose the chains of those who <u>bound</u> thee / And bound them to the <u>love</u> of Christ. / With them thou wast cast into the <u>fu</u>rnace / And were not consumed, O rightly wondrous <u>Theodore</u>, /// But magnified the Lord together with them,

Then thou wast crucified, O blessèd <u>Theodore</u> / Emulating Him who stretched out His <u>arms</u> upon the Cross, / And remained <u>hanging</u> on the tree for <u>three</u> days / Until thou didst commit thy soul into the <u>hands</u> of God / And finished the course of suffering set be<u>fore</u> thee, / O thou pinnacle of <u>martyrdom</u>, / Thou great pillar <u>of</u> the Church, /// Thou adornment of the faithful and converser with the <u>angels</u>.

Glory..., now and ever..., Theotokion, in the same Tone: (and melody)

Rain down upon me, O <u>Lady</u>, / The flowing waters of thy <u>mercy</u>, / And as <u>thou</u> art <u>merciful</u>, / Give drink to my heart being consumed by the heat of my <u>passions</u>; / And cause drops of compunction to fall upon me, O <u>Maiden</u>, / That I may find consolation, I <u>pray</u> thee, /// Together with those who sincerely <u>shed</u> their tears.

Or the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone: (and melody)

Beholding Christ, who loveth mankind, <u>cru</u>cified, / His side <u>pierced</u> by a spear, / The all-<u>pure</u> one, cried aloud, la<u>menting</u>: / "What is this, <u>O</u> my Son? / How have these thankless people re<u>wa</u>rded Thee / For all the good things Thou hast <u>done</u> for them?" / Dost Thou hasten to leave me childless, O most be<u>loved</u> Son? /// I marvel, O Compassionate One, at Thy voluntary cruci<u>fixion</u>!"

The General Troparion of the Hieromartyrs, in Tone 4: [None being given in the Menaion]

Like the apostles in <u>cha</u>racter, / And successors on their throne, O divinely-in<u>spir</u>ed ones / Through visions you both <u>found</u> your work / Rightly dividing the <u>word</u> of truth. / You didst suffer for the <u>sake</u> of the faith / Even to the <u>she</u>dding of your blood. /// O hieromartyrs Januarius and Theodore, pray to Christ God that our <u>souls</u> may be saved.

Being adorned with the chrism of <u>prie</u>sthood / And the blood of <u>ma</u>rtyrdom, / You shine down on earth as you rejoice in <u>heaven</u>, / O glorious Januarius and <u>The</u>odore, Watching over all who come to your temple and who <u>cry</u> aloud: /// Protect us all through your <u>prayers</u> to the <u>Lo</u>ver of mankind.

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
