Vespers

At "Lord, I call...," 3 stichera, in Tone 4: To the melody, "As one valiant among the martyrs...."

We behold thee, O martyr Julian, / Blazing like the <u>rays</u> of the Sun, / Illumining the earth with thy mystical <u>splendors</u> / Driving back the assault of the dark and <u>go</u>dless night, / And we celebrate thy divine and radiant <u>memory</u>, / Bowing down before thy <u>holy</u> shrine /// And from it drawing the <u>hea</u>ling of our souls.

Brutally scourged and <u>bea</u>ten, / Thou wast shamefully paraded from <u>town</u> to town, / <u>Thrown</u> into the dungeon and caged with <u>wild</u> beasts, / Brought to the sea and <u>drowned</u> in the deep; / Thus thou didst receive thy <u>ble</u>ssèd end / Never renouncing the <u>Ma</u>ster of all, /// O thou, most richly-bless't and glorious <u>ma</u>rtyr.

Cast onto the shore from the <u>depths</u> of the sea / By the direction of the <u>Spi</u>rit / Thou wast <u>found</u> by an honorable <u>woman</u> / Who bore thee up, O martyr <u>Julian</u>, / And buried thine incorrupt but tortured <u>bo</u>dy / Which had proved victorious over the torments of the <u>devil</u> /// Through the power and <u>action</u> of grace.

Glory..., in the same Tone:

Drinking the inexhaustible draught of pure faith, O <u>ble</u>ssèd one, / Victoriously didst thou pass through thy <u>struggles</u>, / And <u>luminous with dew, like a never-waning star</u>, / Shining brightly with the light of Christ, the never-<u>setting Sun</u>, / Thou didst triumph over i<u>do</u>latry. / Shedding light upon every town along the journey of thy <u>martyrdom</u>, / Thou didst come to thy blessèd end in the <u>wa</u>ters of the sea, / And wearing thy crown came to stand in the <u>pre</u>sence of Christ. / Beseech Him now, O most-glorious <u>Julian</u>, /// That the souls of those who faithfully honor thy memory <u>may</u> be saved.

21 JUNE

Now and ever..., Theotokion, or this Stavrotheotokion in the same Tone: *To the melody, "Having set all aside...."*

Beholding her Lamb up<u>on</u> the Cross, / The unblemished ewe-lamb, the immaculate <u>Lady</u>, / Cried out in maternal a<u>mazement</u>: / 'What is this new and all-glorious <u>wo</u>nder, / O my <u>Swee</u>test Child? / How hath this ungrateful assembly betrayed Thee to <u>Pi</u>late, / And condemn Thee to death, the <u>Life</u> of all? /// Yet do I praise Thine ineffable conde<u>sce</u>nsion, O Word!'

Or Dogmatic Theotokion if a Resurrection service.

At the Aposticha, the stichera from the Octoechos, and then,

Glory..., in Tone 6:

Come all ye who love the <u>martyrs</u> / And let us piously praise the glorious <u>Julian</u>, / Who like Paul, his fellow citizen of Tarsus and initiate in the <u>my</u>steries, / In his journeys sanctified both the land and the <u>sea</u> with his blood. / Faithfully, he completed his course and entered the <u>wa</u>ters of the deep, / There, he crushed the head of the dragon and all his <u>serpents</u>. / And leaving behind all the <u>things</u> of the earth / Was translated into the eternal <u>mansions</u>, / Where he received the reward of his labors from the hands of the Al<u>mighty</u>, /// Ever praying for the cleansing of our souls and great <u>mercy</u>.

Now and ever..., the Stavrotheotokion, in the same Tone: *To the melody, "On the third day..."*

Standing with Thy pure disciple be<u>fore</u> the Tree / At Thy cruci<u>fixion</u>, / The all-pure Virgin <u>cried</u> aloud: / "Woe is me, why dost Thou <u>suffer</u>, O Christ, /// Who art the dispassion of all?"

The Troparion of the Saint, in Tone 4: (General Troparion of the Martyrs)

Thy holy martyr <u>Ju</u>lian, O Lord, /

Through his sufferings received his incorruptible crown from <u>Thee</u>, our God / For having Thy strength he laid low his <u>e</u>nemies /

And shattered the powerless boldness of <u>demons</u> /// Through his intercessions, O Christ God, <u>save</u> our souls.

Let us <u>wo</u>rthily honor <u>Ju</u>lian today / As an invincible warrior of <u>piety</u>, / A true <u>wi</u>tness and <u>so</u>ldier of the Truth, / And let us all cry <u>out</u> to him: /// Pray to Christ <u>God</u> on be<u>half</u> of us all.

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
