The 8th Day of February

Afterfeast of the Meeting of the Lord; the Holy Greatmartyr Theodore the General (Stratelates); and the Prophet Zechariah, who beheld the Sickle.

Vespers

At "Lord, I call...," 6 stichera:

3 stichera of the Greatmartyr in Tone 4: *To the melody, "As one valiant among the martyrs...."*

Thou wast revealed by the Holy <u>Spi</u>rit / As an invincible warrior and brave <u>ma</u>rtyr for Christ, / For having cast <u>down</u> the adversary with the <u>wi</u>sdom of thy words / And thy long<u>su</u>ffering deeds, / Thou didst receive the crown of <u>vi</u>ctory, /// And art numbered with the angelic hosts, O greatmartyr Theodore.

Thou didst become a divine pillar of piety, O greatly-<u>rich</u> one / By reducing to ashes the temples of the un<u>go</u>dly; / Thou wast <u>led</u> as a pure and blameless lamb and a well-pleasing <u>offering</u>, / To Him, who sacrificed Him<u>self</u> for thee, / And who had thus glorified thy holy <u>me</u>mory, /// Granting thee as a treasury of miracles to those still in the world, O martyr <u>The</u>odore.

Thou wast hanged and stretched upon a Cross, / Thy flesh was flayed, and arrows pierced thy <u>bo</u>dy, / And <u>suffering great torments thou wast behea</u>ded by a sword; / Through this all didst thou remain invincible and vic<u>to</u>rious / By the power of Him who Himself was <u>nailed</u> to the Cross, /// O Theodore, thou glory of martyrs!

And stichera, of the Prophet in Tone 8: *To the melody, "What shall we call thee, O saint?..."*

By <u>liv</u>ing on earth the life of the <u>angels</u>, / Thou didst converse with them, O <u>prophet divine</u>, / Thereby illumining thy mind past <u>all</u> under<u>standing</u>: / Thine eyes were cleansed so thou might behold wondrous <u>images</u>, / Great secrets were disclosed and great mysteries were re<u>vealed</u> to thee. / Therefore, having prophetic illumination and <u>spi</u>ritual re<u>ne</u>wal, /// Pray that our <u>souls</u> may be saved.

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<u>Thou</u> wast revealed as an earthly <u>angel</u> / Having the angels of heaven as thy companions on earth; / And beholding things beyond the <u>plane</u> of the world / Thou didst shine forth, a radiant beacon of <u>spi</u>ritual light; / And in the words of the Psalmist, thou wast like the fruitful <u>o</u>live tree / That, by the action of God, pours its <u>oil</u> upon the <u>fai</u>thful. /// Pray that our <u>souls</u> may be saved.

Delighting now in the longed-for spiritual <u>union</u> with God / And partaking of eternal sweetness and beholding His ineffable <u>glory</u>, / And adorned with a crown of beauty as His <u>most</u>-true <u>prophet</u>, / Earnestly pray for us who praise thee, O Zechariah, well-<u>plea</u>sing to God, /// That our <u>souls</u> may be saved.

Note: If it be Lent, then we sing: (taken from the 18th Day of February):

Glory..., now and ever..., the Theotokion, in Tone 8:

Whom art thou emulating, O wretched soul? / One who never rises to repentance? / One not afraid of the fire awaiting the wicked? / Arise, and quickly call on her who is our lone defense, / And cry out: "O Virgin Mother! / Entreat thy Son and our God /// That He deliver my soul from the snare of the deceiver!"

Or the Stavrotheotokion, in Tone 8: To the melody "O most-glorious wonder...."

When <u>she</u> be<u>held</u> the Lamb / Stretched out by His own will upon the <u>Tree</u> of the Cross, / With maternal tears the <u>Ewe</u>-lamb <u>cried</u> aloud: / "Oh, my Son, what is this strange <u>sight</u> that I see? / How is it He, who giveth life to <u>all</u> as Lord, / Is put to <u>death</u> by long<u>su</u>ffering, / While granting the earthborn the resur<u>rection</u>? /// O my God, I glorify Thy great conde<u>scension</u>!"

Otherwise:

Glory..., in Tone 8: To the regular melody

Let <u>us</u>, the faithful praise and bless <u>Theodore</u>, / The greatmartyr and <u>cha</u>mpion of the world / For he is truly the heir of God's blessings, rightly <u>named</u> "the <u>Gift</u> of God," /// And he prays to Christ our God to <u>save</u> our souls.

Now and ever.., of the Feast, in the same Tone:

He who is borne aloft by the <u>Cherubīm</u> / And praised in hymns by the <u>Ser</u>aphīm, / Is brought today into the holy temple in accordance to the Law / And rests in the arms of the elder as on a throne. / From Joseph He receives gifts fitting for God; / A pair of doves, the symbols of His spotless Church / And of the newly-chosen people, the Gentiles; / And two young pigeons, for He is the Originator of the two Covenants, both Old and the New. / And Simeon, having been granted the fulfillment of the prophecies concerning himself, / Blesses Mary the Virgin Theotokos, and foretells in figures the Passion of her Son. / From Him he begs release and cries aloud: / 'Now let me depart, O Master, as Thou hast promised me; / For I have seen Thee, the pre-eternal Light, /// The Lord and Savior of the people that bear the name of Christ.

At the Aposticha, these stichera, in Tone 2: To the melody, "O House of Ephratha"

Open wide, ye gates of heaven, /

For behold, Christ the Babe is brought into the temple as an <u>offering</u> /// To God the Father by His Most-pure <u>Mo</u>ther!

Verse: Lord, now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace.

Christ the sacred ember of fire / Whom the holy Isaiah foresaw, / Now <u>rests</u> in the arms of the Theo<u>tokos</u> /// As she brings Him to the elder at the altar.

Verse: A light to enlighten the Gentiles, and the glory of Thy people Israel.

Simeon held the Master in his arms with <u>fear</u> and joy / And asked that he now be permitted to de<u>part</u> this life, /// Singing the praises of the <u>Mo</u>ther of God.

Glory..., now and ever..., in Tone 5:

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To<u>day</u>, the precious memory of the passion-<u>bea</u>rer of Christ / Shines brighter than the <u>morning star</u>, / In<u>vi</u>sibly enlightening the hearts of the <u>fai</u>thful, / Driving a<u>way</u> the clouds that <u>darken</u> our souls / By the action and grace of the <u>Spi</u>rit. / Let <u>us</u>, who love the martyrs, <u>cry</u> aloud: / Rejoice, O Theodore, for thou hast been revealed to us as God's <u>gift</u> of grace, / Extending a multitude of miracles to those who <u>ha</u>sten to thee, / And do thou <u>cease</u>lessly <u>pray</u> to Christ, / That <u>those</u> who faithfully celebrate thy precious <u>memory</u> /// Receive eternal <u>ble</u>ssings.

Now and ever..., of the Feast, in the same Tone:

The <u>An</u>cient of Days, having be<u>come</u> a babe / Is brought into the temple by His Virgin <u>Mo</u>ther / Ful<u>filling</u> the promise of <u>His</u> own Law; / And <u>Sim</u>eon said re<u>cei</u>ving Him: / O Holy One, now lettest Thou thy servant de<u>part</u> in peace /// For mine eyes have <u>seen</u> Thy sal<u>va</u>tion.

The Troparion of the Greatmartyr, in Tone 4:

Thou wast a valiant general in the army of the <u>heavenly King</u> / And a militant de<u>fender of the Truth.</u> / By wisely taking up the <u>a</u>rmor of faith / Thou didst defeat the legions of demons becoming thyself a victorious <u>martyr</u> /// Therefore, O passion-bearing Theodore, we faithfully bless and <u>ho</u>nor thee.

The Troparion of the Feast, in Tone 1:

Rejoice, O Virgin Theotokos, full of <u>grace!</u> / From thee hast risen the Sun of Righteousness, <u>Christ</u> our God, / Who gives <u>light</u> to those in <u>da</u>rkness. / Rejoice, also, O righteous <u>elder</u>; / Thou didst ac<u>cept</u> in thine arms the Re<u>dee</u>mer of our souls /// Who grants us the resurrection.

Matins

At "God is the Lord...," the Troparion of the Feast, twice; Glory..., that of the Greatmartyr, once; Now and ever..., that of the Feast.

THEODORE THE GENERAL; THE PROPHET ZECHARIAH

After the 1st Kathisma, the Sessional Hymn, in Tone 3: To the melody, "The beauty of virginity...."

The holy Simeon lifted Thee up, O Christ, / Incarnate of the Virgin / And with joy he cried aloud: / Lord, now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace! / Anna, the pure and glorious prophetess also gave witness and praise to Thee, / And we cry out to Thee, O <u>Gi</u>ver of Life, /// Glory to Thee for showing Thy bountiful mercy toward us.

Glory..., now and ever..., Repeat: "The holy Simeon lifted Thee up...."

After the 2nd Kathisma, the Sessional hymn, in Tone 8: To the melody, "The shepherd's pipes...."

<u>Thou</u>, who art co-eternal with the <u>Fa</u>ther / Wast <u>born</u> on earth, / And carried into the temple, O <u>Infinite One!</u> / Rejoicing, the elder took Thee in his arms, and <u>cried</u> aloud: / Now lettest me whom Thou hast visited de<u>part</u> in peace / Ac<u>cording to</u> Thy word, /// O Thou whose good pleasure it is, as God, to save the <u>hu</u>man race.

Glory..., now and ever..., Repeat: "Thou, who art co-eternal...."

The Canon

The Canon of the Feast, with 6 Troparia, including the Irmos and two Canons for the Saints, with 4 Troparia each. — *incomplete as of 12/31/1214*

After the Third Ode, the Kontakion of the Feast, in Tone 1:

By Thy Nativity, Thou didst sanctify the Virgin's womb, / And didst bless Simeon's hands, O Christ God. / <u>Now</u> Thou hast come and saved us through <u>love</u>. /// Grant peace to all Orthodox Christians, O only Lover of <u>mankind</u>!

Ikos: Let us hasten to the Theotokos, desiring to behold her Son brought to Symeon. The bodiless powers, looking at Him from on-High, were filled with amazement, saying 'Now we see wondrous and most marvelous things, past understanding and past telling. He who created Adam is carries as a babe. He who cannot be compassed is encompassed by the arms of the elder, He who rests uncircumscribed in the bosom of

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His Father, is voluntarily circumscribed in the flesh, but not in divinity, He who alone loveth mankind.'

After the Sixth Ode, the Kontakion of the Greatmartyr, in Tone 2:

Having put <u>on</u> the <u>a</u>rmor of faith / And arming thy soul with <u>cou</u>rage / Thou didst <u>take</u> into thy hand the word of <u>God</u> as a spear / And thou didst vanquish the <u>e</u>nemy. / O <u>Theo</u>dore, great among all the <u>ma</u>rtyrs, /// Together with them pray Christ <u>God</u> on be<u>half</u> of our souls.

Ikos: Come, all ye faithful, and with wreaths of praise let us crown Theodore, for through the radiance of his wondrous miracles hath he shone forth as God's great gift to the world; and having vanquished the enemy through his mighty struggle, now showers us all with drops of healing in place of his blood, to the great joy of Christ, who grants everlasting peace to all. Therefore, O greatmartyr Theodore, ceaselessly entreat Him on behalf of our souls.

At the Aposticha, these stichera, in Tone 1: To the melody, "O all-praised martyrs...."

The <u>true</u>, most-glorious <u>ark</u> of God, / His most-pure <u>Mo</u>ther, / Carries Him <u>forth</u> today into the temple for its purifi<u>ca</u>tion, / And places Him into the arms of <u>Simeon</u> the wise, / Thus <u>sanctifying the Holy of Holies</u> /// Which now rejoices in Him that alone is <u>Holy</u>.

Verse: Lord, now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace.

<u>Si</u>meon is <u>glo</u>rified today, / For having piously received Christ as a living coal of purifi<u>cation</u>, / He <u>ki</u>sses Him in witness, and being purified, rejoices / And asks for <u>leave</u> to de<u>part</u> in peace, /// And we the faithful bless and honor him with un<u>cea</u>sing praise.

Verse: A light to enlighten the Gentiles, and the glory of Thy people Israel.

To<u>day</u> the most-pure Virgin, the living portal of the <u>King</u> and Lord, / Brings Him into the temple <u>ca</u>rried in her arms, /

And <u>enters</u> through the doors that had once been mystically <u>shut</u> on earth, /// And beholding her presence, the choirs of angels praise her with divine song.

THEODORE THE GENERAL; THE PROPHET ZECHARIAH

Glory..., in Tone 8:

<u>Bra</u>vely thou didst triumph over deceit, O <u>Theodore</u>, / Shaming the inhumanity of Linicius with thy fiery <u>e</u>loquence. / And having ac<u>complished thy ma</u>rtyrdom, / Thou dost now rejoice with angles in <u>hea</u>ven Ever entreating Christ God, O <u>ble</u>ssed one, /// That He be merciful to us on the Day of <u>Ju</u>dgment.

Now and ever..., in Tone 5:

<u>Search</u> ye the <u>Scriptures</u> / As Christ our King commands in the <u>Go</u>spels, / For <u>there</u> we will find Him that was born of the <u>Virgin</u>; / Him that was <u>wrapped</u> in swaddling clothes, and laid in a <u>manger</u> / And fed with His <u>Mo</u>ther's milk; / <u>Him</u> that was circumcised and <u>carried</u> by Simeon — / Him that <u>came</u> to earth not as an apparition nor by conjecture, but in <u>very</u> truth. /// To Him let us cry: O God before the ages, glory to Thee!

Liturgy

At the Beatitudes, 8 Troparia: 4 from the Eighth Ode of the Canon of the Feast, and 4 from the Sixth Ode of the Canon of the Martyr.

The Prokeimenon in Tone 7: The righteous one shall rejoice in the Lord, / and shall set his hope in Him. *Verse:* Hear my voice, O God, when I pray into Thee!

The Epistle: (292) 2 Timothy 2:1-10

The Alleluia in Tone 4: The righteous shall flourish like a palm tree and shall grow like a cedar in Lebanon. *Verse:* They that are planted in the house of the Lord shall flourish in the courts of our God.

The Gospel: (36) Matthew 10:16-22

The Communion Hymn of the Saint: The righteous shall be in everlasting remembrance. He shall not be afraid of evil tidings.

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
