Note: We sing the All-night Vigil if it be a temple dedicated to the Greatmartyr, or the Rector so desires.

Small Vespers

4 stichera, in Tone 4: To the melody, "As one valiant among the martyrs...."

Brightly hath the Spring of <u>Truth</u> arrived / Renewing all creation by the knowledge of Christ, the <u>Giver of life.</u> / And with like <u>brightness</u> and under<u>standing</u> / Hath George, the Great Martyr <u>of</u> the Lord /// Trampled underfoot the madness of the enemy. *(twice)*

Thou didst wage war in defense of the King of the <u>ages</u> / Laying low the lawless ranks of the <u>enemy</u> / Shining <u>forth</u> with the grace <u>given</u> thee by God / As a strong warrior and worker of <u>wonders</u>, / O thrice-blessèd <u>martyr</u> George. /// Therefore, intercede that our souls may be saved.

O thrice-blessèd <u>martyr</u> George, / Streams of healing grace flow upon those who <u>come</u> to thee. / <u>Thou</u> art a defender of the <u>bo</u>dies and souls / Of those who faithfully run to the shelter of thy pro<u>tection</u>, / O wonder-worthy <u>martyr</u>, /// Adornment of all who have suffered for Christ.

Glory..., in Tone 6:

Rejoice and be <u>glad</u>, / Thou soldier of the <u>great</u> King and God, / For thy service hast been well-<u>pleasing</u> to Him. And despising every <u>ea</u>rthly thing / Thou hast attained eternal life in the <u>heavens</u>. / And thy mortal remains drive maladies <u>away</u> from men / For Christ, whom thou hast loved hath <u>glo</u>rified thee /// O blessèd martyr George.

Verse: The righteous shall flourish like a palm tree and shall grow like a cedar in Lebanon.

Let us praise the Feast of Feasts together, /

And glorify Christ our Savior, /

For our victorious martyr hath slain the oppressive enemy. /

And with one voice let us ceaselessly cry out aloud: ///

After the Introductory Psalm, "Blessèd is the man...," the first Kathisma. At "Lord, I call...," 8 stichera.

Thou didst suffer with the <u>Sa</u>vior, / O great and glorious <u>martyr</u> George. / And for <u>following</u> Him to thine own <u>vo</u>luntarily death / Thou dost co-reign with Him in <u>sple</u>ndor / Having put on the radiant purple of thine <u>own</u> blood /// Adorned with the scepter of thy deeds and the crown of thy victory forever.

Arming thyself with the <u>shield</u> of faith / And the breastplate of <u>righteousness</u>, / Thou didst <u>take</u> up the <u>spear</u> of the Cross, And being invincible against thine <u>enemies</u> / Thou didst vanquish the ranks of the <u>demons</u>. / And abiding now amidst the company of <u>angels</u> / Thou dost sanctify and save the faithful when they <u>cry</u> to thee, /// O Greatmartyr and valiant <u>champion</u> George. /

We know thee, O George, the bearer of <u>vi</u>ctory, / As a brilliantly <u>shining sun</u>, / As a <u>radiant star</u>, blazing in the <u>fi</u>rmament, / As a beautiful pearl of <u>great price</u>, / As a dazzling and <u>pre</u>cious stone, / As one brave among the <u>ma</u>rtyrs / And as one glorified as the defender of the <u>fai</u>thful /// Who rightly celebrate thy <u>me</u>mory.

Glory..., in Tone 6:

Thou didst live a life worthy of thy name, O <u>so</u>ldier George, / For by bearing the Cross of Christ upon thy <u>shoulder</u> / Thou didst plough the earth made barren by the deception of <u>Sa</u>tan, / And having uprooted the thorns of i<u>do</u>latry / Thou didst plant the vine of the <u>O</u>rthodox Faith, / From which streams of healing flow upon the faithful through<u>out</u> the world. / And since thou art a faithful steward of the <u>Tri</u>nity /// We beseech thee to pray for the peace of the world and the sal<u>va</u>tion of our souls.

Now and ever..., of the Feast: (from the Pentecostarion)

The Entrance and the Prokeimenon of the day.

Three Readings:

The Reading from the Prophecy of Isaiah: (Chapter 43:9-14)

^{43:9}Thus saith the Lord: "All the nations are gathered together, and princes shall be gathered out of them: who will declare these things? Or who will declare to you things from the beginning? standing or guile deceive his soul.¹²For the fascination of wickedness obscures that which is good, and roving desire perverts the innocent mind. ¹³Being so perfected in a short time, he fulfilled long years; ¹⁴for his soul was pleasing to the Lord, therefore He took him quickly from the midst of wickedness. ¹⁵Yet this the peoples saw and did not understand, neither did they take such a

thing to heart, that God's grace and hath of mercy are upon His holy ones, and He

Through his <u>glorious passion</u> / George, the illustrious martyr, hath gladdened the <u>po</u>wers on high, / And rejoicing with them now, he moves us the faithful to raise a <u>song</u> to him / Who are here assembled to <u>keep</u> his feast. / As a <u>se</u>rvant of Christ, he comes to <u>ce</u>lebrate with us. / Therefore, let us worthily <u>ho</u>nor him /// For he ceaselessly intercedes before God that He grant us His great <u>me</u>rcy.

<u>Cultivating the better things by thy heroic sufferings</u> / Thou didst bring to Christ the best fruits of thy <u>labors</u>, / And having established thy love for God on the <u>rock</u> of faith / Thou didst reject <u>fear</u> by the <u>power</u> of faith. / <u>Thus</u>, O all-praised one, thou didst acquire the <u>heavens</u> by love, / Where, having boldness, through thy most <u>pleasing prayers</u> /// Ask peace for our souls, the cleansing of sins, and great <u>mercy</u>.

And this sticheron, in Tone 4:

Come, all ye assemblies of the <u>fai</u>thful, / Come, and let us <u>keep</u> the feast! / For the <u>radiant</u> memorial of the passion-bearer George has dawned for <u>us</u> today. / Shining with all the virtues, he invisibly en<u>lightens</u> our hearts. / Therefore, with one accord, let us all cry <u>out</u> to him: / Rejoice, O warrior of Christ, the <u>King</u> of all! / Rejoice, O radiant joy of the <u>fai</u>thful! / Rejoice, most rich and all-<u>sple</u>ndid one! / Entreat Christ God, the Master of all for us, O <u>ble</u>ssèd one, /// That he may preserve us from the temptations of the evil one and save our souls.

Glory..., in Tone 5: (the composition of Theophanes)

<u>Come</u>, and let us delight in the re<u>turn</u> of Spring / For the Resurrection of Christ hath risen upon the world! / Let us <u>come</u>, and let us all rejoice and be glad, / For the me<u>mo</u>rial of the passion-bearer hath risen upon the <u>fai</u>thful! / Let us come together and celebrate who love the <u>feasts</u> of the Church! / For by <u>bravely</u> fighting his tormentors as a valiant <u>warrior</u> / He put them to <u>shame</u> by willingly following Christ the <u>Sa</u>vior; / He did not spare his earthly <u>ve</u>ssel of clay, / But stripped it <u>bare</u>, and transformed it by his <u>sufferings</u>. / Let us <u>all</u> cry out to him: /// O George, the passion-bearer, <u>pray</u> that our <u>souls</u> may be saved.

Now and ever..., of the Feast: (from the Pentecostarion)

At the Aposticha, these stichera, in Tone 4: *To the melody, "Called from on high...."*

The people praise thy memory with <u>psalms</u> and hymns, /

O most <u>glo</u>rious George, /

For with <u>ra</u>diant majesty hath it shone <u>forth</u> for us /

Adorned with glory and grace, /

And all the angels and martyrs with the apostles <u>cea</u>selessly exalt /

Thy sufferings and the struggles, O holy martyr, /

As they glorify Christ God, our Savior, /

Who hath so <u>glo</u>rified thee. ///

Beseech Him now that He may save and en<u>lighten our souls</u>.

Verse: The righteous shall flourish like a palm tree and shall grow like a cedar in Lebanon.

Having put on the whole <u>a</u>rmor of Christ, /

Thou, O George, hast been found by those who sought thee not. /

And tortured by fire for the sake of Christ thou didst mock the ungodly savag'ry /

Of the pagans gods and all their \underline{va} nity, /

Crying out to those tormenting thee: /

"I go to war for <u>Christ</u> my King! /

And neither beasts nor wheels of torture, nor any device of torture /

Will ever separate me from the love of Christ my God!" ///

Entreat Him now to save and enlighten our souls.

Verse: They that are planted in the house of the Lord shall flourish in the courts of our God.

Scorning all the instruments of torture /

And laying aside all fear /

Thou didst finish thy course with godliness /

Wearing thy crown, O victorious martyr George, /

And we crown thy glorious memory with our <u>flo</u>wers of praise /

As we venerate thy precious <u>relics</u> with faith. /

And as thou standest now before the throne of our Master, <u>Christ</u> our God, /// Ceaselessly pray that He save and enlighten our souls.

Glory..., in the same Tone: To the usual melody (the composition of the Studite)

Let us spiritually praise, O <u>bre</u>thren, / That living, tempered-steel of en<u>du</u>rance, <u>George</u>, the glorious martyr who was burnt for the <u>sake</u> of Christ, / For he faced dangers and sufferings which tormented his perishable <u>bo</u>dy. / But love overcame <u>na</u>ture / And allowed him, through death, to reach the be<u>lo</u>vèd One, /// Christ God, the <u>Sa</u>vior of our souls.

Now and ever..., of the Feast: (from the Pentecostarion).

After the Blessing of the Loaves, the Troparion of St. George, in Tone 4:

Thou didst fight the good fight, O <u>ma</u>rtyr of Christ, / By faith denouncing the faithlessness of those who <u>to</u>rtured thee; / Thou didst present thyself as a well-pleasing <u>sa</u>crifice to God, / Receiving from Him thy crown of <u>vi</u>ctory. /// By thy prayers, O holy one, may we receive the for<u>gi</u>veness of our sins. *(twice)*

And then, in Tone 4: "Rejoice, O Virgin Theotokos.... (once)

And the rest, as usual.

Matins

At "God is the Lord..." the Troparion of the Feast: *(from the Pentecostarion) (twice),* "Glory..., *that of the Martyr;* Now and ever...," that of the Feast *(once).*

After the 1st Kathisma, the Sessional hymn from the Pentecostarion, Glory..., now and ever..., the same hymn is repeated.

After the 2nd Kathisma, the Sessional Hymn of the Saint, in Tone 1: *To the melody, "Thy tomb, O Savior...."*

Behold, the Spring of Grace hath <u>dawned</u> for us, / And the Resurrection of Christ hath i<u>llu</u>mined all, / And to<u>ge</u>ther with it, we celebrate the festive and radiant <u>fe</u>stival / Of the great and <u>va</u>liant <u>martyr</u>, George, / <u>Come</u>, all ye faithful, bearing candles burning with <u>fai</u>thfulness /// And let us celebrate this most bright and <u>glo</u>rious day!

Glory..., another Sessional Hymn the same Tone: *To the melody, "The choir of angels...."*

Disdaining the army on earth, thou didst seek the glory of heaven /

HOLY GREATMARTYR, WONDERWORKER AND VICTORY-BEARER GEORGE

And endured a painful and <u>vio</u>lent end. / So we <u>ce</u>lebrate thy most precious and holy <u>me</u>mory today, /// Offering our praises to Christ, O all-blessèd Great<u>ma</u>rtyr George.

Now and ever..., from the Pentecostarion, or this Theotokion, in the same Tone:

All who <u>flee</u> with love to thy <u>goo</u>dness, / Know thee truly to be the <u>Mo</u>ther of God / <u>Who</u> after giving birth was shown to be <u>Vi</u>rgin; / For we sinners have thee as our <u>interce</u>ssor, / And our salvation amidst all <u>pe</u>rils, /// O only <u>pure</u> one!

Polyeley and Magnification:

We magnify thee, // O holy and victorious greatmartyr George / and we honor thy precious sufferings / which thou didst endure for Christ.

Selected Psalm verses:

God is our refuge and our strength.Our help in the afflictions that come heavily upon us.

After the Polyeley, the Sessional Hymn, in Tone 3: *To the melody, "The faith divine...."*

Aflame with fervent love for the Master /

Courageously didst thou destroy the vanity of idols by confessing Christ at the tribunal./

Therefore, we beseech thee, O glorious and victorious great<u>martyr</u> George, / To entreat Christ God that he grant our <u>souls</u> great <u>mercy</u>.

Glory..., another Sessional Hymn, in Tone 4: *To the melody, "Joseph was amazed...."*

Cultivating the seed of the divine com<u>ma</u>ndments / Thou hast scattered all thy riches a<u>mong</u> the poor / Piously ex<u>chang</u>ing thine earthly wealth for the <u>glo</u>ry of Christ / And submitting thyself to great torments and <u>struggles</u>. / And having thus participated in the passion and <u>suffering</u> of the King / Thou dost now share in His Resur<u>rection</u> /// And dost now pray to Him on our behalf, O great<u>ma</u>rtyr George.

Now and ever..., of the Sessional Hymn of the Feast: *(from the Pentecostarion)*, or this Theotokion, in the same Tone:

O immaculate <u>La</u>dy, / Who alone art most blessèd <u>and</u> most pure / Through <u>thee</u> have we come to know the Word of the Father, <u>Christ</u> our God. /// Therefore with ceaseless songs of praise, we <u>magnify</u> thee!

1st Antiphon of the 4th Tone (Song of Ascents), "From my youth...."

Prokeimenon in the Tone 4:

The righteous shall flourish like a palm tree / and shall grow like a cedar in Lebanon. *Verse:* They that are planted in the house of the Lord shall flourish in the courts of our God.

Let every breath....

Gospel: (63) Luke 12:2-12

After Psalm 50 (51), the Post-Gospel sticheron, of the Martyr, in Tone 6:

Today the whole world is illumined by the light of the <u>martyr</u>, / And the Church of Christ, adorned with flowers, <u>cries</u> aloud: / O holy George, our fervent defender and <u>fa</u>vorite of Christ, /// Always intercede for us, thy <u>se</u>rvants.

The Canon

We sing the Canon from the Pentecostarion, with 6 Troparia, including the Irmos; and two Canons of the Greatmartyr, with 8 Troparia.

Ode 1

First Canon of the Saint, in Tone 2,

the composition of Theophanes.

Irmos: In days of old a mighty force sent the armies of Pharaoh into the deep sea; the Word Incarnate hath destroyed pernicious sin; the most glorious Lord hath been greatly glorified.

Refrain: Holy greatmartyr George, pray to God for us!

Standing, most radiant, before the precious throne of the Ruler of all, O crownbearing martyr George, by thy prayers and supplications preserve those who fervently call upon thee with faith and love.

Thou didst prove to be a profitable servant for Christ, O greatmartyr George, for through thy heroic sufferings, the Master of all laid up for thee riches in heaven as a reward for thy courageous and glorious deeds.

Firmly and with resolve didst thou set thyself upon the path of war, O most blessed

George, and cast down the vicious ranks of the tormentors, becoming the advocate of all who call upon thee.

Thou, O glorious one, hast now come to that blessed life which is within Christ for which thou didst fight, even to the shedding of thy blood. Pray now that we, who faithfully cry out unto thee, may be saved from all adversity, O holy martyr George.

Refrain: Most Holy Theotokos, save us!

Theotokion: Thou art the spiritual paradise, O Mother of God, since thou didst contain within thy womb the divine Word by whom all the heavens and the earth, and all that is within them came to be. Therefore, pray with boldness to Him that we who sing thy praises may be saved.

Second Canon of the Saint, Tone 4,

the composition of Cosmas.

Irmos: The people of Israel, having fled across the watery deep of the Red Sea with dryshod feet, beheld the horsemen of the enemy drowned therein, and they cried aloud with joy: let us sing to God, for He hath been glorified!

Thou didst complete thy course of blessèd sufferings and attained unto heaven, O crown-bearing martyr George, where thou art revealed as an unblemished flower and a companion to the angels, with whom thou dost joyfully sing: Let us sing to God, for He hath been glorified! *(twice)*

Glory...,

Still sweating with the pain of thy blessed torments, thy face, O greatmartyr George, glowed with the grace of peace. The bodiless powers were amazed by thy divine sufferings, and now together with them, thou dost joyfully sing: Let us sing to God, for He hath been glorified!

Now and ever...,

Theotokion: The blossoming rod of Aaron prefigured thee as the stem of the root of Jesse, O most pure one, for thou didst give to the world the Flower, God incarnate. Cease not to entreat Him on behalf of us all, who flee to thee, O Eer-virgin Mary.

Katavasia: The Irmosi of the Paschal Canon.

Ode 3

First Canon of the Saint

Irmos: The Church of the Gentiles was like a desert, barren in its pagan ways, but now it hath blossomed by Thy coming, O Lord; in that same coming is my heart confirmed.

O glorious and blessed martyr resplendent in thy crown of suffering, we piously

entreat thee: pray to our Redeemer and God that He deliver from every need and affliction all who call on thee in faith.

Being enlightened by an abundance of radiant light, O all-wise one, drive the darkness of despair and the gloominess of passions away from all who call on thee in faith.

Made steadfast by hope and love, and strengthened by the power of Christ, thou didst overthrow the deceit of idolatry.

Theotokion: **O** all-pure one, thou gavest birth in the flesh to the incorporeal One, who enlightened the ends of the earth and who is equally unoriginate, before all time, with the Father. Therefore, we, the faithful, honor thee as the Mother of God.

Second Canon of the Saint

Irmos: Like a barren woman hath the Church of the Gentiles given birth, and beholding the great assembly of children born of her, we cry out to our wondrous God: Holy art Thou, O Lord!

After quietly distributing thy wealth to the poor, O George, and anointing thyself with the oil of love before the contest, didst thou defeat thy tormentor with both thy body and thy soul. *(twice)*

Made steadfast by grace and consumed with the fire of zeal for the sake of Christ, thou wast angered at the deceit of idolatry, O George, and those who sought to interrogate thee, could neither see nor hurt thee.

Theotokion: **O** thou who barest in thine arms and feedest at thy breast Him, who feedeth everything that hath breath, O Mother of God, worshipping Him we entreat thee: pray to Him on behalf of us all.

Katavasia.

Fighting courageously in the ways of <u>ho</u>liness / And overthrowing the deceit of impiety / Thou didst trample down the <u>arrogance</u> of the <u>enemy;</u> / And being kindled by divine zeal / Thou didst quench the tyrant's <u>blasphemy</u>. / And in reward for thy <u>torments</u> / Thou didst receive thy crown and the power of <u>hea</u>ling. / O great and victorious <u>martyr</u> George, / Inter<u>cede</u> with <u>Christ</u> our God, /// To grant remission of sins to those who keep thy holy memory with love.

Glory...,

Distributing thine earthly wealth to <u>all</u> on earth / By thy labors inheriting the riches of <u>heaven</u>, / O wise and victorious <u>martyr</u> George. / And putting on the breastplate of the <u>pre</u>cious Cross / Thou didst shame the tyrant's <u>arrogance</u>, / Granting grace and the gifts of <u>healing by</u> thy prayers To all who <u>ask</u> them of thee. / O great and victorious <u>martyr</u> George, / Inter<u>cede</u> with <u>Christ</u> our God, /// To grant remission of sins to those who keep thy holy <u>me</u>mory with love.

Now and ever..., from the Pentecostarion.

Ode 4

First Canon of the Saint

Irmos: Thou hast come from a Virgin, not as a minister nor an angel, but as the Lord Himself incarnate; to me a human, Thou hast brought salvation; so I cry to Thee: Glory to Thy power, O Lord!

We sing the praises of thy struggles, O most blessed George, by which thou hast overthrown the worship of idols thus bringing an end to the beguilements of the demons.

Still the tumult of temptations and every evil assault of the demons from those who sing thy praises, O wondrous and worthy soldier of Christ.

Thou hast risen at dawn like the morning star, O valiant George, thou confirmation of the faith, chasing away the darkness of error and saving those who sing thy praises.

Theotokion: **O** Virgin, thou hast given birth in thy holiness and goodness to Him who is Salvation, thus redeeming mankind and restoring the image that before had fallen.

Second Canon of the Saint

Irmos: I have heard the truly glorious report of Thee, O Christ; how, being God incarnate, Thou didst assume the likeness of mortal man, yet didst remain that which Thou wast before. Wherefore, I glorify Thy power.

Thy words of wisdom, which transcended human understanding, struck thine oppressors with awe at thy trial, O greatmartyr George, and Christ God became known by those who knew Him not.

With one word of the faith of Christ, O all-wise George, didst thou demolish the absurd fables of the philosophers and denounce the falsehood of their gods, O

champion of the Holy Trinity.

The oppressors who heard thy words were put to shame, O George, for by exposing their gods by preaching Christ God who was crucified in the flesh, thou didst show them to be objects of scorn, and abolished the deceit that destroys the souls of mankind.

Theotokion: We glorify thee, O All-pure Lady and Mother of God, the one true Ever-virgin whom Moses, the eye-witness of God, beheld prefigured in the bush that not consumed by fire.

Ode 5

First Canon of the Saint

Irmos: O Savior Christ, Thou enlightenment of those who lie in darkness and the salvation of those in despair, rising early unto Thee, O King of the world, may I be enlightened by Thy radiance, for I know no other God than Thee.

Having a martyr's boldness before the Master, earnestly beseech Him for the salvation of those who sing thy praises, O all-blessèd George, transforming our sick souls by thy prayers, O victorious martyr.

Rejoicing as a martyr with the assembly of angels, O crown-bearing George, and being completely instilled with eternal and blessèd glory, do thou rescue from the stormy waves of the sea those who run to thee for protection.

As Thou art merciful, O Christ, deliver us from every necessity, destroying the manifold turmoil of sin and danger, and accept, O Lord, the prayers of Thy servant, George.

Theotokion: Thou, O Mother of God, didst repay the debt of first mother, Eve, having borne in the flesh, the Savior of the world. Therefore, we all call thee blessèd, O Virgin, alone without blemish and full of grace.

Second Canon of the Saint

Irmos: Send down upon us Thine enlightenment, O Lord, and free us from the gloom of transgressions, O Good One, granting us Thy peace.

Wrestling courageously against diverse deceptions and being naked to the world, O victorious martyr George, thou didst strip away the power of the prince of the world.

Protected by the weapon of the Cross, O valiant George, by the strength of faith and the power of love, thou didst blunt all the sharp edges of the cruel enemy's weaponry.

Theotokion: The womb of the virgin put to shame the wisdom of the oppressors, for when a child was bitten on the hand by a deadly viper, the prideful arrogance of him who fell away from God, was trampled beneath the feet of the faithful.

HOLY GREATMARTYR, WONDERWORKER AND VICTORY-BEARER GEORGE

Ode 6

First Canon of the Saint

Irmos: Compassed about in the depths of sin, I entreat the unfathomable depth of Thy compassion; bring me out of corruption, O Lord.

We ceaselessly praise thy courageous deeds and valor, which transcend nature and are beyond all understanding, O most blessed martyr George.

As thou art now a companion in the ranks of heaven and truly a worthy beholder of the glory of God, save, through thy prayers, those who faithfully honor thee.

Having dedicated thyself to God in every way, and receiving from Him the brilliant grace of working miracles, do thou, O all-blessèd George, distribute them to all who are in need.

Theotokion: Save me, O most pure Lady, for now I flee under thy protection! Shelter me by thy prayers, for as the Mother of the Almighty, thou canst do all things that thou desirest.

Second Canon of the Saint

Irmos: Prefiguring Thy three-day burial, the prophet Jonah prayed within the belly of the whale and cried aloud: Deliver us from corruption, O Jesus, Lord of hosts!

Thou didst cry out, O George, with boldness to the Creator: Give not thy servant over to the lawless, but grant me the strength to destroy their arrogance.

Scorning the implements of torture, O George, thou didst of thine own will courageously set out upon thy *pódvig*, receiving from Christ God thy crown and the honors of victory.

Thy deceitful tormentors marveled as they beheld thy virtuous endurance of torture, O George, and thy prayers to Christ, the Giver of life.

Theotokion: The serpent of old made me subject to death by deceiving my first mother Eve; but now, my Creator hath returned me from corruption through thee, O most pure Lady.

Katavasia.

The Kontakion of St. George, in Tone 4:

God hath made thee His own <u>hu</u>sbandman, / For thou hast gathered for thyself the sheaves of <u>vi</u>rtue; / Through thy suffering at the shedding of thy blood didst a<u>ttain</u> to Christ. / And having sown in tears, thou dost now <u>reap</u> with joy, /// Through thy prayers, obtain the forgiveness of our sins, O greatmartyr George.

Ikos: Desiring to attain to Christ the King, who laid down His life for the life of the world, the great warrior George, made haste to die for Him, for having the divine zeal in his heart, he offered his own self up. Let us then, sing with faith, and praise him as our fervent advocate and glorious servant of Christ, who clearly emulated his own Master and ceaselessly begs Him to grant us the forgiveness of our sins.

Ode 7

First Canon of the Saint

Irmos: The profane command of the lawless tyrant made the flames to rise exceedingly, but Christ sent the dew of the Spirit to the godly youths; blessed is He and most glorious!

Emulating thy Master, O glorious martyr, thou didst willingly hasten to the struggle, and having won the victory thou art become the guardian of the Church of Christ preserving her forever by thy prayers.

As an invincible martyr, O most wise George, a warrior through suffering, and an undefeated champion of the Faith, be thou, through thy prayers, an unshakeable fortress protecting those who call upon thee in faith.

Wisely scattering the divine seed, thou hast made it increase by watering it with the streams of thy blood; and by cultivating it by the labor of thy sufferings, thou hast quenched the insolence of thine oppressors.

Theotokion: Thou didst remain virgin after giving birth to the Nourisher of all, who through His ineffable compassion and abundant mercy as God, became man. Entreat Him, O most pure Lady for the salvation of us all.

Second Canon of the Saint

Irmos: In Babylon of old, the children of Abraham trampled upon the flames of the furnace as they sang aloud: Blessèd art Thou, O God of our fathers!

Seeing the deceit of idolatry prevailing, O George, and burning with fervent zeal, thou didst set out upon the road leading to thy martyrdom crying: Blessèd art Thou, O God of our fathers!

Being a true teacher of the persecuted Faith, O George, thou didst expose the gloominess of deceit crying: Blessèd art Thou, O God of our fathers!

Thou didst cut falsehood off at the root thereby cultivating great faith through piety, O George, and rejoicing thou didst cry: Blessèd art Thou, O God of our fathers!

Theotokion: More exalted than all creation, O Theotokos, thou gavest birth to the Creator and Lord of all. Therefore, we cry out to thee, O blessèd one: the Lord is with thee!

Katavasia.

Ode 8

The First Canon of the Saint

Irmos: In Babylon of old by the command of God, the fiery furnace worked in a double way: it burned the Chaldeans while it refreshed the faithful who sang: Bless the Lord, all you works of the Lord!

Cause the flood of grievous passions, perils and troubled circumstance, the onset of disease, the attacks of demons and the invasions of enemies to cease, through thy prayers, O crown-bearing martyr George.

As thou art an invincible martyr, a champion of godliness and a victor crowned by God, wholly illumined with purity by the light of the Holy Trinity, by thine intercessions, save those who honor thee, O blessèd dweller of paradise.

Beautifully adorned with the spiritual crown, and by the diadem and scepter of the Kingdom, and clothed in royal purple dyed red with thine own blood, thou dost reign with the King of hosts, O blessèd martyr George.

Theotokion: **O** Virgin Mother, thou gavest birth to Him who was timelessly begotten of the Father, the Son who shone forth before the very beginning of time, the Creator of all things visible and invisible. Therefore, all the nations glorify thee, O Theotokos.

The Second Canon of the Saint

Irmos: Rejoicing in their condemnation by the tyrant for not worshiping all his abominable gods, but rather the One Living God, the youths disdained the fire, and sprinkled with dew by the angel they sang: Bless the Lord, O ye works of the Lord, praise and exalt Him above all throughout all ages.

Strengthened by the Holy Spirit thou didst distain the instruments of torture, for thou would not offer praise to deaf idols made of stone, but only to Christ, faithfully loving Him alone; and thou didst cry out to Him, O George: Bless the Lord, O ye works of the Lord, praise and exalt Him above all throughout all ages.

Not seeking the fleeting beauty of this life, but rather, rejoicing in the hope of life divine, thou didst submit thyself to sufferings, O holy martyr George, and paying no heed to thy terrible mutilations, with a steadfast spirit thou didst cry out: Bless the Lord, O ye works of the Lord, praise and exalt Him above all throughout all ages.

Seeing thy body sawn apart by instruments of bronze, and dismembered limb by limb, while yet alive thou didst cry out: Know ye not, unworthy ones, that these present tortures are for the glory yet to come? So, bless the Lord, O ye works of the Lord, praise and exalt Him above all throughout all ages.

Let us bless the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, the Lord.

Theotokion: The Lord of all who formed thee from the rib of Adam, became incarnate of thy virginity, O Lady, and praising Him we all cry out: Bless the Lord, O ye works of the Lord, praise and exalt Him above all throughout all ages.

We praise, bless, and worship the Lord, singing and exalting Him throughout the ages.

Katavasia.

Ode 9

The First Canon of the Saint

Irmos: The Son of the eternal Father, God the Lord incarnate of the Virgin, hats appeared to us to give light to those in darkness and to gather those who had gone astray; so we magnify thee, O Theotokos

Ceaselessly entreat the Lord for us who praise thee, O blessèd one, for thou art a martyr of Christ; the vanquisher the tyrants; an exorcist of evil spirits; a vigilant guardian of the Church; and the steadfast defender of us all.

The Master of all hath richly rewarded thee for all thy sufferings, O thrice-blessèd one, and standing now before Him with the boldness of a martyr, preserve those who joyously honor thee.

Though the earth hath covered thee, the heavens have received thee and have opened the gates of paradise before thee, O passion-bearing martyr. Rejoice and be glad, and by thy prayers, preserve those who faithfully praise thy holy memory.

Theotokion: The Tabernacle of the Witness in which lie the tablets of the Law, the jar of manna, and the golden ark, prefigured thee, O all-pure Virgin; for like it, thou didst contain the unoriginate Word incarnate, within thy womb, O Theotokos.

The Second Canon of the Saint

Irmos: Though born of mortal parents, thou gavest birth to the Creator, O most pure Theotokos, our pride and boast. Therefore we magnify thee as the sovereign Lady ruling over all!

The priests sing hymns, the kings offer praise, and we the people honor thy glorious sufferings, O holy martyr George; therefore, we all call thee blessed! *(twice)*

All the hosts of heaven glorify thy struggles, for by sacrificing thyself, thou didst make thyself most pleasing to God, O holy martyr George; therefore, we all call thee blessed!

Theotokion: **R**ejoice, O most pure Theotokos, our pride and boast, who thyself wast born of mortal parents yet gavest birth to the Maker of all creation! Therefore we magnify thee as the sovereign Lady over all!

Katavasia:

HOLY GREATMARTYR, WONDERWORKER AND VICTORY-BEARER GEORGE

The Exapostilarion of the Saint:

A joyful Spring hath dawned for us! The divine and radiant Resurrection hath sent us from the earth towards the heavenly Passover; and with it, the splendid memorial of the most glorious martyr George, which we brightly celebrate with joy, shines forth, that we may be found worthy to obtain divine grace from Christ the Savior.

Glory..., Another Exapostilarion:

The rays of thy miracles illumine all creation with the brilliance of the Sun, O passionbearer George, Therefore, celebrating thy holy memory, we praise Him who hath risen from the tomb.

Now and ever..., the Exapostilarion of the Feast: (from the Pentecostarion).

At the Praises, 4 stichera, in Tone 2: To the melody, "Down from the tree...."

<u>Come</u>, all ye faithful, having just sung the <u>songs</u> of praise / Of the great and holy <u>Feast</u> of Feasts, / The joyful and glorious Resur<u>re</u>ction of Christ, / And let us <u>ce</u>lebrate again / And <u>keep</u> the festival of the great and holy <u>ma</u>rtyr George. / Let us weave for him a crown of <u>vi</u>ctory / From the beautiful <u>flo</u>wers of Spring /// That through his prayers we may be delivered from all <u>sor</u>row and sin.

Wholly hast thou consecrated thyself to Him who gave thee life, /

O holy and victorious greatmartyr George, /

As a living, spiritual, and most pure sacrifice, /

A whole burnt-offering, most pleasing to God. /

Therefore, thou art become a most fervent intercessor ///

Rescuing from every storm and tempest those who faithfully sing and <u>call</u> upon thee.

Earnestly having sown the seed of the Word with purity of soul, /

Increasing it by thy labors and sufferings, /

And wisely storing it in the vaults of heaven, /

Thou hast found the incorruptible delights of paradise. /

And now, enjoying them, O most blessed one, ///

By thy prayers save those faithfully sing thy <u>prai</u>ses.

O <u>pa</u>ssion-bearer George, thou <u>ma</u>rtyr of Christ, / By thy prayers save those assailed by danger and ne<u>ce</u>ssity, / Delivering them from every <u>pe</u>ril and harm, / Chasing from them cruel sorrows which des<u>troy</u> the soul; /

And <u>ask</u> that mercy and grace may be <u>granted</u> to us, /// That being saved by thy prayers, we may joyfully honor thy precious <u>sufferings</u>.

Glory..., in Tone 2: *(in the usual melody)*

Let your eyelids nod assent to righteous things, as King Solomon said, /
For he who looks for the right shall find favor with Christ God. /
And heeding these words, George, the long-suffering martyr /
Set out to follow the teachings of the Master. /
He gave himself over to the lawless torturers /
And endured the most terrible torments; /
Finally surrendering his body out of love for the Creator. /
Then Belial was wounded and put to shame beholding thee perfect and crowned with glory. /
O martyr of Christ, who abidest now in the courts of the Lord with all the hosts on high ///

Intercede before Him that our <u>souls</u> may be saved.

Now and ever..., of the Feast: (from the Pentecostarion).

The Great Doxology. After the Trisagion prayers through "Our Father...," the Troparion of the Martyr; Glory..., now and ever...: the Troparion of the Feast (from the Pentecostarion); the usual litanies, the Dismissal, and the First Hour.

At the Anointing with oil from the lamp before the Icon of the Saint, these stichera, in Tone 2: To the melody, "Down from the tree...."

Dis<u>dai</u>ning all the <u>things</u> of this life, / O thou great <u>light</u> of the Church, / Thou didst lead thy soul to love one <u>Ma</u>ster, / Courageously committing thyself to boundless <u>torment</u>, / And hath re<u>ceived</u> a beautiful crown of <u>vi</u>ctory. / Therefore, we beseech thee, O <u>ble</u>ssed one, / To pray for those who <u>praise</u> thee, / O victorious great<u>ma</u>rtyr George, /// That we be delivered from every danger and ne<u>ce</u>ssity.

The <u>so</u>rrows and grief, and all the <u>storms</u> of this life, / And the turbulence of evil <u>passions</u>, / Assail me now, O <u>ble</u>ssed one, / But be thou my help and my pro<u>te</u>ction, / And <u>guard</u> me standing <u>by</u> my side. / For I have come to <u>thee</u> with faith / That, being saved, I may ever <u>bless</u> thee, /// O great and holy <u>ma</u>rtyr George.

Glory..., in Tone 4: (to the usual melody)

Come, all ye assemblies of the <u>fa</u>ithful, And let us keep the sacred <u>fe</u>stival / And the <u>radiant memory of the passion-bearing martyr George, /</u> Who, shining with virtue, invisibly en<u>lightens our hearts. /</u> Let us sing with one voice and in <u>unity of mind</u>: / Rejoice, O warrior of Christ the <u>King</u> of all! / Rejoice, O all-radiant <u>boast</u> of the Faith! / Rejoice, O splendid and richly-<u>ble</u>ssèd one! / Entreat the Master of all, <u>Christ</u> our God, /// That He may preserve us from the temptations of evil and <u>save</u> our souls.

Now and ever..., of the Feast: (from the Pentecostarion).

Liturgy

At the Beatitudes, 8 Troparia: 4 from the designated Ode of the Canon from the Pentecostarion; and 4 from the Third Ode of the First Canon of the Martyr.

1.-4. From the designated canon.

- **5. O** glorious and blessèd martyr resplendent in thy crown of suffering, we piously entreat thee: pray to our Redeemer and God that He deliver from every need and affliction all who call on thee in faith.
- **6.** Being enlightened by an abundance of radiant light, O all-wise one, drive the darkness of despair and the gloominess of passions away from all who call on thee in faith.
- 7. Made steadfast by hope and love, and strengthened by the power of Christ, thou didst overthrow the deceit of idolatry.
- 8. *Theotokion:* O all-pure one, thou gavest birth in the flesh to the incorporeal One, who enlightened the ends of the earth and who is equally unoriginate, before all time, with the Father. Therefore, we, the faithful, honor thee as the Mother of God.

The Troparion of St. George, in Tone 4:

Thou didst fight the good fight, O <u>ma</u>rtyr of Christ, / By faith denouncing the faithlessness of those who <u>to</u>rtured thee; / Thou didst present thyself as a well-pleasing <u>sa</u>crifice to God, /

Receiving from Him thy crown of <u>vi</u>ctory. /// By thy prayers, O holy one, may we receive the for<u>gi</u>veness of our sins.

The Kontakion of St. George, in Tone 4:

God hath made thee His own <u>hu</u>sbandman, / For thou hast gathered for thyself the sheaves of <u>vi</u>rtue; / Through thy suffering at the shedding of thy blood didst a<u>ttain</u> to Christ. / And having sown in tears, thou dost now <u>reap</u> with joy, /// Through thy prayers, obtain the forgiveness of our sins, O great<u>ma</u>rtyr George.

The Prokeimenon *(from the Pentecostarion);* and that of the Martyr, in Tone 7: The righteous one shall rejoice in the Lord, and shall set his hope on him.

The Epistle: (29) Acts 12:1-11

The Alleluia *(from the Pentecostarion);* **and that of the Martyr, in Tone 4:** The righteous shall flourish like a palm tree, and shall grow like a cedar in Lebanon.

The Gospel: (52) John 15:17-16:2

Communion Hymn: The righteous shall be in everlasting remembrance. He shall not be afraid of evil tidings. Alleluia....

Note: Under the Julian (Old) Calendar, the service of Greatmartyr George may fall between Great and Holy Friday and the Thursday of the 5th Week after Pascha. If it should fall on Great Friday, Great Saturday, or Pascha itself, the service (stichera, canon, etc.), is sung on Monday of Bright Week, together with the service appointed on that day.

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
