

The 2nd Day of June

**Our Venerable Father among the Saints, Nicephorus
(pronounced Nikíphorus) the Confessor, Patriarch of
Constantinople.**

Vespers

At “Lord, I call...,” 6 stichera,

3 stichera, in Tone 4: *To the melody, “As one valiant among the martyrs....”*

We know thee, O father Níkíphorus, /
As a zealous defender of the truth and confirmation of the faith, /
A teacher of divine doctrine, an advocate of piety, an abode of purity, /
A chosen vessel of the sweetness of the Spirit, /
And a priceless treasury of teachings, ///
A divinely inspired hierarch and a pillar of the Church of Christ

We praise thee, O wise and holy hierarch, /
As the successor of the apostles and co-equal of the martyrs, /
An emulator of the ascetics, the affirmation of teachers, /
A model of divine virtue and a master of the mysteries of Christ, /
A river flowing with divine wisdom ///
Submerging in its flood the thoughts of blasphemers and the lawless.

Having increased the talent of wisdom given thee, /
O richly-bless’t hierarch, /
Thou wast vouchsafed to enter into the joy of thy Lord; /
And now, being adorned with the grace of divine radiance /
And shining with rays of spiritual light /
Thou standest at the right hand of the Giver of Life ///
Basking in the rays of His brilliance.

And 3 stichera, in Tone 8: *Special melody: “O most glorious wonder...”*

O ven’rable father Níkíphorus, /
Thou didst enter as a priest of the Law, /
Into the true, divine, and impassable tabernacle of the Lord, /
And in emulation of Christ, /
Thou didst offer thine own blood and not that of another /
Thereby greatly pleasing God ///
By not submitting to the vengeance of the council.

O most wise father Níkíphorus, /

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Thou partaker of divine wisdom, /
Thy words and thy deeds have adorned thee /
As have thy priestly vestments and the truth of thy teachings. /
For the confession of which thou didst suffer imprisonment /
Together with all the other evils which befell thee /
Which thou didst earnestly endure ///
Through the strength of thy will, O blessed one.

Thou wast truly an instrument of the Spirit /
Sounding forth from above with the music of divinity /
Proclaiming the ineffable mystery of the Savior; /
Thou didst clearly proclaim to us the incarnation of the Word /
Which is truly past all reasoning and understanding /
As a divinely-inspired trumpet, O most honored Nikiphorus. /

Glory... now and ever..., Theotokion, in the same Tone:

Save me, O most pure sovereign Lady, /
Who ineffably bore Christ our Savior! /
For I have thee as my invincible wall and protection; /
O mediatrix, joy and divine consolation of my soul, /
Thou alone can deliver me from the gnawing of the worm that never sleeps ///
And from the eternal fire, O Mother of Christ God.

Or the Stavrotheotokion:

Behold Thee, O Jesus, nailed to the Cross /
And accepting suffering of Thine own will, /
The Virgin, Thy Mother, O Master, cried aloud: /
“Woe is me, O my sweet Child! /
How is it that Thou dost endure unjust wounding, /
O Physician who healeth the infirmities of mankind ///
And by Thy loving-kindness dost deliver all from corruption?”

Or Dogmatic Theotokion if a Resurrection service.

Troparion of St. Nicephorus, in Tone 4:

In truth thou wast revealed to thy flock as a rule of faith,
A model of humility and teacher of abstinence, /
So thou didst win the heights of humility, riches by poverty; /
O holy hierarch, father Nikiphorus, /
Intercede with Christ our God to save our souls.
